Mar 11th: Kamikazes make it to the American fleet sanctuary at Ulithi Atoll and damage the Escort Carrier Randolph. Mongmit in Burma is liberated by British 36th Division.

Mar 12th: With the fall of Kustrin, the Soviets are over the Oder-Neisse line from Stettin to Gorlitz. German 7th Army can contain the US bridgehead at Remagen, but they can't put much of a dent in it and their counterattacks fail. Myotha (near Mandalay) is liberated by 20th Indian Division.

Mar 14th: XII Corps of US 3rd Army attacks over the Moselle southeast of Koblenz. 19th Indian Division is fighting house by house in Mandalay. The Soviets take Zvolen in Western Czechoslovakia. A soldier who is favoured by Mars one day may not be under his hand the next. 2Lt Harry J Michael, a platoon commander in the 80th Infantry Division, established a

reputation yesterday. As his platoon advanced through thick woods near Neiderzerf Germany, his scouting instincts enabled him to lead his men to numerous successes against machinegun posts, pillboxes and an artillery battery. On two solitary reconnaissance trips he brought in 13 prisoners. At dawn today, a sniper starts to trouble his platoon, so he slips out to hunt him and is killed. He is posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor.

Mar 15th: The RAF drops a 22,000-pound bomb called Grand Slam on the Bielfield viaduct. US 7th and 3rd Armies join in a concerted effort to clear the Germans out of the area bounded by the Saar, Moselle and Rhine. US cruisers bombard targets in the Kuriles. The Marines on Iwo Jima brace themselves up to tackle the last main pocket of Japanese in the northeast corner of the Island while the Japanese commander, Lt Gen Tadamichi Kuribayashi sends a last message to Tokyo then seeks his own death in battle. The Japanese continue to attempt to close in on Meiktila but are finding this both difficult and costly. PFC Silvestre S Herrera is a Mexican born soldier who is not yet an American citizen, but he is in the 36th Division outside Mertzwiller, France. In the morning, when his platoon comes under sudden fire from an enemy strongpoint, he charges them and gets eight German POWs. In the afternoon, his platoon starts to enter a minefield and is then fired on. Herrera charges into the minefield with the intention of distracting the enemy's fire from his comrades. However, two mines shatter one leg and sever another; but he continues to provide covering fire until the enemy strongpoint is dealt with. He receives the Medal of Honor and US citizenship.

Mar 16th: Bitche falls to units of 7th Army as it strives to break through the southern end of the Siegfried Line. The 2nd and 3rd Ukrainian Fronts launch their riposte to the German's Lake Balaton Offensive and savage 3rd Hungarian Army in the northern flank of the new Salient. US troops on Luzon strive to break through the Shimbu line south of Manila and in the north along the Villa Verde track; elsewhere US forces and Filipino guerrillas gang up on the Japanese on Basilan Island.

Mar 17th: The Ludendorff Bridge at Remagen collapses, but US engineers have built several more around it already, and the offensive continues. Koblenz falls into 3rd Army's hands. The Chinese 6th Army continues to advance southwest of Lashio in Burma.

Delays in Delivery of RCN's New Arctic and Offshore Patrol Ships

In November, the Department of National Defence stated the first Arctic and Offshore Patrol Ships, or AOPS, was expected by the end of March. That won't be happening, DND confirmed to this newspaper. The department can't provide any specific details on a new delivery date for the ship being built by Irving Shipbuilding Inc. on the east coast. But it noted that delivery would happen sometime before June 21. The first AOPS was to have been delivered in 2013, with Arctic operations set for 2015. But ongoing problems with the government's national shipbuilding program and delays in awarding the contract continued to push schedules back. There is some risk the first vessel could be delayed beyond the June timeframe, DND acknowledged. In addition, the department confirmed the delivery of the second AOPS has also

fallen behind schedule. The scheduled delivery of the other ships could also slip. "Lessons are being learned from the construction of the first ship, and are benefiting the construction of the second ship," explained DND spokeswoman Jessica Lamirande. "However, as some inefficiencies are still being resolved, and because resources were focused on the first ship,



delivery of the second ship has been delayed. The delivery timelines for the second to sixth ships are still being assessed, and updates will be shared once available."

The second AOPS was supposed to be delivered in late 2020. The last of the six ships was supposed to arrive in

2024. Irving took the first AOPS to sea in November 2019, and formal sea trials began on January 31, 2020. A second round of formal sea trials, combined with at sea Royal Canadian Navy crew familiarization, will be held before the vessel is accepted, Lamirande added. After completion of sea trials, any remaining pre-delivery work will proceed, and any deficiencies noted during the inspection, test, and trials program will be addressed, she said. 3/6/2020 More delays affect delivery of navy's new Arctic and Offshore Patrol Ships | Ottawa Citizen https://ottawacitizen.com/news/national/defence-watch/more-delays-affect-delivery-of-navys-new-arctic-and-offshore-patrol-ships 3/5 The first AOPS returned in February from successful sea trials, said Irving spokesman Tom Ormsby. "We are working with the Department of National Defence to include a crew training period for this complex ship before she leaves this shipyard this spring," he added. In 2017, the Senate defence committee raised concerns about the capabilities of the AOPS. "This (concern) is based on the fact that these ships cannot operate in ice more than a metre thick, are slower than a BC Ferry, can only operate in the arctic from June to October and will require a coast guard escort when in the northern waters," the senators pointed out in their report. These capabilities should be independently reviewed to meet Canada's sovereignty needs, they added. The Senate also noted that the ships "will lack significant force projection in the form of weapons system." "These limitations are troubling and raise the question of whether the taxpayers are receiving value for the monies spent," the Senate report stated. In January 2015, the federal government announced it had awarded Irving a \$2.6-billion contract to build five ships. In 2018 that deal was expanded to add a sixth vessel. Additionally, two AOPS will be built for the Canadian Coast Guard immediately following those for the Royal Canadian Navy. It was recently revealed in the House of Commons that Irving is receiving \$58 million to make what the federal government calls minimal changes to the existing AOPS design so it can be used by the coast guard. "The modifications have been assessed as minimal as none of the identified modifications will impact major elements of the AOPS design and construction," Bernadette Jordan, the minister of fisheries, oceans and the Canadian Coast Guard, stated in her written response tabled in the Commons.

But critics are questioning why taxpayers are spending \$58 million if the changes are so limited. "That's a very expensive tweak," said Aaron Wudrick, the federal director of the Canadian Taxpayers Federation. "We'd like see some clarity from the government on what could possibly justify such an increase in the price tag." Ormsby said the first step for the firm is to fully review the AOPS design and then confirm any modifications that are needed to be made for the coast guard. "Once modifications have been agreed to, these changes must then be worked through and implemented into the design," he noted. "While not making major changes that a first-in-class design would require, the Canadian Coast Guard has a different and critical mission, including the need for scientific laboratories for sampling and research, so each vessel is being tailored to suit the Canadian Coast Guard's unique and important role." The government only pays for actual costs incurred, he added.



Official Commemorative Poster


On 5 March 2020, we unveiled the official poster commemorating the 75th anniversary of the Liberation of the Netherlands and V-E Day.

This special commemorative poster features Sergeant (Retd) Norman Kirby, a Veteran of the North Shore (New Brunswick) Regiment. He and his platoon helped liberate many towns in the Netherlands in the closing weeks of the fighting in Northwest Europe before V-E Day was declared on 8 May 1945. In the background of the poster is an historical photo showing happy citizens of the Dutch town of Zwolle welcoming Canadian soldiers after being freed in April 1945.



CF Starts Initial Preparations for Responding to Pandemic

Canadian military shifts to pre-pandemic planning: Gen Jonathan Vance

As the novel coronavirus continues to spread, the Canadian military has started initial preparations for responding to a pandemic. Chief of the Defence Staff Gen Jon Vance issued a message Wednesday that he has ordered the activation of Operation Laser Phase 2, which is described as "Pandemic/Preparation." "The purpose of that

tasking order is to ensure that the CAF (Canadian Armed Forces) implements measures to maintain CAF operational effectiveness and readiness, preserve essential health services for (members), and maintain responsive support to civil authorities as part of the CG (government) response," Vance's message noted. "We will immediately assess CAF posture at home and abroad, refresh business continuity plans, protect defence supply chains, and take measures to limit the chance of infection of our (members)."

In addition, the Canadian Forces is reviewing whether its current stocks of health-related supplies are adequate, the Department of National Defence confirmed to this newspaper. Commanders will also review requests from military personnel for non-essential leave-related travel on a case-by-case basis. Vance noted that military leaders will also scrutinize all scheduled activities that involve large gatherings and be prepared to cancel or postpone military "involvement in discretionary domestic events should Canada need to transition to pandemic mitigation." Vance noted that while much remains to be discovered about the coronavirus, the majority of persons who contract the infection will recover. The disease is particularly severe for older age groups and those with underlying medical conditions. "This disease appears to not be as clinically severe as the 2003 SAR epidemic," the general added. The best way to prevent coronavirus "is to avoid becoming infected," Vance added. That means enforcing high standards of personal hygiene such as washing hands often. In the meantime, the families of Canadian military personnel stationed in China have been brought back to Canada, twenty-two family members were sent home. The nine Canadian military personnel remain in China. In addition, there are five military staff in Japan, 15 in South Korea and 76 in Italy, all countries dealing with larger outbreaks of the coronavirus. Those military personnel, and their families, are staying in those countries. "We are constantly assessing the risk as new information arises," noted DND spokeswoman Jessica Lamirande. "Should the risk become unacceptable, efforts will be made to repatriate our staff and/or their families."

In addition, one training course involving military personnel has already been postponed, she added. The Royal Canadian Air Force's Visual Flight Rules Basic course offered at the Nav Centre in Cornwall, Ont. has been suspended after contractors raised concerns about the

coronavirus. "This decision, which affects eight students, will have no lasting operational impact on the RCAF," Lamirande stated. "This is a temporary measure, with full courses expected to resume in the near future." The US Army stationed in Italy has closed schools, churches and gyms at its base in Vicenza. Military personnel there have been ordered to avoid non-essential travel to certain areas of the country. US forces in South Korea have also limited travel and restricted access to bases. The US Army has started screening new recruits at four training facilities in the US for the coronavirus. Currently, there are no confirmed cases of the virus among Canadian Forces personnel. Lamirande said that several Canadian Forces members in Canada and abroad have been tested for the virus, and all have come back negative. The testing includes military personnel who took part in operations to repatriate Canadians from China and Japan, she added.

Last Week: The a/c in the picture is a Bristol Beaufighter, it was the distraction. The weapon



is a Molins 6-pounder aircraft gun. This gun was a version of the 6-pounder anti-tank gun adapted for automatic fire by the Molins company who manufactured automatic cigarette dispensing machines in their day job. It was mounted in a Mosquito (Mark FB XVIII) nicknamed the 'Tsetse' and, when fired, it served as a hand brake. Like the Vickers "K" Gun on the Hurricane, it

could apparently knock 50 mph off the aircraft speed when firing. Molins did a great job on automatic loaders in the war, developing a 6-pounder version for landing craft, and the automatic fuze setter and loader for the 3.7-inch AA gun as well.
