World War 2 – 1945

John Thompson Strategic analyst - quotes from his book "Spirit Over Steel"

Feb 12th: In Burma XXXIII Corps makes a second crossing of the Irrawaddy, while the indirect approach of the IV Corps in the South finally reaches the same river at Myitche and Seikpyu, the mixed British/Chinese/US forces in the North also start attracting Japanese attention. US XI Corps now advances south in the Bataan Peninsula to clear out Japanese forces there.

Feb 13th: A raid by 773 Lancasters starts the raids on Dresden (which 600 US bombers will visit tomorrow) – the purposes of the raid remain controversial, but some 70,000 people will die in the raids. British troops clear the Reichswald in the Rhineland campaign. 20th Indian Division keeps its Irrawaddy Bridgehead despite determined Japanese counterattacks. The siege of Budapest is over and Malinovsky's troops take 100,000 prisoners including ethnic Germans, politically incorrect Hungarians and the survivors of the four German and three Hungarian divisions who comprised the defence; tens of thousands of Hungarian girls are raped and some 80% of the city is in ruins. Corregidor is bombarded and 11th Airborne liberates Cavite.

Feb 14th: The Soviets keep advancing in Pomerania and to the Neisse River. Elements of 1st Canadian Army reach the bank of the Rhine opposite Emmerich as the Rhineland offensive continues; while US forces to the south are pausing for the next push. Elements of IV Corps cross the Irrawaddy as the Japanese concentrate to defend Mandalay. Water Tender Second Class Elmer Charles Bigelow on the Destroyer USS Fletcher rushes into the magazine of a gun turret after it is hit by a Japanese shell off Corregidor. Desperate to prevent a larger explosion he had grabbed two fire extinguishers but no breathing gear to protect against the poisonous fumes of combusting propellant. His selfless courage prevents further damage to his ship in exchange for mortal damage to his lungs. He receives a posthumous Medal of Honor.

Feb 15th: Konev's troops surround Breslau. An American Regiment is landed on the southern tip of the Bataan Peninsula.

Feb 16th: Task Force-58 now has 12 fleet carriers, four escort carriers, eight battleships, 15 assorted cruisers and 83 destroyers; which now come under Spruance's 5th Fleet for two days of raids in the Tokyo area. The US Navy also has ten escort carriers, five battleships, five cruisers and 16 destroyers (plus many smaller escorts) working over Iwo Jima. Another cruiser force is working over targets in the Kuriles. A battalion parachutes onto Corregidor and another lands by sea in the start of a ten-day fight to retake the island-fort in the mouth of Manila Bay.

Feb 17th: TF-58's latest raid is over; 2,700 sorties (with a loss of 88 aircraft) have hit numerous targets and destroyed some 180 Japanese fighters; the force is now heading to Iwo Jima. Heavy bombers also work over Iwo Jima – whose defenders hit USS Tennessee and other warships. US 3rd and 7th Armies stage attacks around Saarlouis and Saarbrucken; while 3rd Canadian Division (the 'Water Rats') have cleared 10 miles of the Rhine's west bank. The RAF sinks Mussolini's last two battleships, Conte di Cavour and Impero, in Trieste harbour. More British troops land in the Arakan while heavy fighting continues around XXXIII Corps. Captured in July 1941, Lieutenant General Dmitry Karbyshev was a trained engineer who designed many sensitive Soviet fortifications and bunkers, and the Germans were eager to get the details of these. He resisted torture and deprivation for many months. He was offered relief if he would join with other turned Soviet senior officers in recruiting for the Germans from among Soviet prisoners, but again refused to cooperate. Today, he was among 400 prisoners at Mauthausen tortured to death by repeated naked exposure to ice cold water while standing outside in the freezing temperatures. For his courage and refusal to cooperate with his captors, he is later named a Hero of the Soviet Union.

Feb 18th: The bombardment of Iwo Jima continues with attacks on Haha Jima and Chichi Jima. US IV Corps of 5th Army attacks to the southwest of Bologna. General Ivan Chernyakhovsky, the young and talented commander of 3rd Belorussian Front dies of wounds he received undertaking a reconnaissance and is replaced by Vasilevsky. 3rd US Army (VIII, XII and XX Corps) attacks, with VII Corps breaking through the Siegfried Line; while XXX British Corps attacks towards Goch in the Rhineland. Hasso-Eccard Frieherr von Manteuffel, one of Germany's great panzer generals (and who once killed a Soviet soldier with a trench knife when his headquarters was raided), is awarded the Knights Cross with Oak Leaves, Swords and

Diamonds. After the war he becomes a politician, is invited to Eisenhower's White House and lectures at West Point.

New Artillery Round Can Successfully Hit Moving Targets

The Marine Corps is eyeing a new artillery round that can successfully hit moving targets *Matthew Cox, Military.Com February 07, 2020*

Raytheon Co just announced that its new laser-guided Excalibur S 155mm artillery round scored direct hits on a moving target in a secret, live-fire test for the Marine Corps last spring. The Excalibur is a combat-proven, precision artillery round capable of hitting within a few feet

of a target at ranges out to 40 kilometers, the company said. The new Excalibur S uses the same GPS technology as the Excalibur 1B variant but adds a semi-active laser seeker to engage both moving land and maritime targets. "The seeker technology will recognize that the target is no longer there, and it will pick up the laser energy from where the target is and redirect itself to that," Trevor Dunwell, director of Raytheon's Excalibur Portfolio, told Military.com.

In a US Navy test, Raytheon fired two projectiles from an M777 155mm Howitzer at a moving target at Yuma Proving Ground, Arizona, and

scored two direct hits, he said. "This happened in April of last year; we had to keep it close-hold working with the Navy ... more specifically for the Marines," Dunwell said. "We set the round for a specific location, we fired it off and, as soon as the round got fired, the target started moving. It realized the target wasn't there and that it had moved somewhere else and ... it switched from GPS to laser designation and then engaged the target."

The Marine Corps is interested in the Excalibur S round but "has not currently placed an order," he said.

The next step is to conduct more tests this year. Dunwell would not reveal when they will occur, nor would he divulge which service will sponsor the next test. If the Marine Corps or the Army decides to purchase the new Excalibur S round, Dunwell said it would not be priced dramatically higher than the current Excalibur 1B, which costs roughly \$70,000 per round. The

new technology would be effective for use in counter-fire artillery missions, he said. "If you think about it, it is critically important because you are going to have to engage moving targets ... especially if you are doing counter-fires," Dunwell said. So, if it's a fire-and-move, now on the counter fire you should be able to engage that moving target."



Saving the Canadian Army Reserve

Relentless Struggle: Saving the Army Reserve 1995-2019



In a new book, Relentless Struggle: Saving the Army Reserve 1995-2019, CP Champion tells the story of Reserves 2000. It was a group of concerned citizens of sufficient stature and influence, many of them Honorary Colonels (HCols) of Army Reserve units who, throughout what became known as the "decade of darkness", thwarted plans by senior officers and civilian officials based mainly in National Defence Headquarters (NDHQ) to amalgamate, shrink and de-fund the Canadian Forces Reserves. "This book is about a group of Canadians who came together to stop a recurring tendency in the upper ranks of the Canadian Armed Forces to weaken and...cripple Canada's Army Reserve," Champion writes. The attacks on the part-time force came against the explicit wishes of successive Ministers of National Defence, even against the policy of the prime minister himself. They were sustained for years and they were very nearly successful. How they were stopped forms Champion's inspiring account of indefatigable effort and undaunted

courage by people of high principle. "Time and again Reserves 2000 prevented the regular forces from effectively destroying the reserves," Champion writes. "Time and again they brought a new minister... to appreciate the perils of listening only to NDHQ, which had almost no corporate memory." As an aside, *Relentless Struggle* also provides a case study on Canada's own deep state. The Reserves are important, especially with Canada's regular army getting ever smaller and, generally, less capable. In Afghanistan reservists at times formed up to 20 percent of Canada's deployed soldiers. They were deployed on prior missions as well. One officer who commanded Reservists in Bosnia, including in actual heavy combat in the Medak Pocket, said that Reservists were "often the most capable and members of those units." Champion avoids operational specifics on that mission or Afghanistan; *Relentless Struggle* isn't a book of war stories. Instead he cites writers such as Christie Blatchford, who covered the topic and who in 2016 hinted at the issue of civil servants ignoring orders and trying to kill the reserves.

Who (or What) Is It?

Last Week: The Douglas XB-42 Mixmaster was an experimental bomber aircraft, designed



for a high, top speed. The unconventional approach was to mount the two engines within the fuselage driving a pair of contra-rotating propellers mounted at the tail in a pusher configuration, leaving the wing and fuselage clean and free of drag-inducing protrusions. First flight occurred in May 1944. Two prototype aircraft were built,

but the end of World War II changed priorities and the advent of the jet engine gave an alternative way toward achieving high speed. The program was cancelled in 1948.

This Week: We return this week to clanking, khaki and green things, much loved by some of you who still wear spurs. Over the more than a century of armoured fighting vehicle history in this great dominion, we have seen some periods of affluent purchase, but far, far more of parsimonious, indeed niggardly spending. Some have speculated that this latter lack of funding is due to the Scottish nature of some ministers, but those who have so thought have been taken care of by the Ancient and Honourable Society of Alba, and forced to repent by joining the Scottish Association of Nudists, a chilling prospect. The real reason is simply that Canadians think little, if at all, of their armed forces, save in times of great need. In short, they have read Kipling:

"For it's Tommy this, an' Tommy that, an' "Chuck him out, the brute!" But it's "Saviour of 'is country" when the guns begin to shoot;"

Nonetheless, there have been attempts to equip the army with the most modern of weapons, even in peace time, but few and far between. One such attempt took place in the years just before the Second World War, when Canada bought Vickers Tank, Light Mk VIs for the Royal Canadian Armoured Corps. Although the vehicles did not see active service with us (although they did with the Mother Country), they proved useful in training our burgeoning armed forces.



However, we don't think that this vehicle, pictured here, was part of that purchase. It certainly would appeal to the bean counters as a cheaper version of, well, anything bigger than a wheelbarrow. It appears to have some armour, and a Bren gun, as well as the requisite tracks. However, we have no idea what it actually is. Can you help us?
