

## Next Wednesday Lunch and Speaker – 1 May 2024

Please join us on Wednesday, May 1<sup>st</sup> to welcome our guest speaker, Lunch starts at 1200hrs, and the presentation will take place in the lecture room at 1330hrs.



We don't have menu details yet, but out featured speaker will be Jack Gin (showing his documentary about a WW1 soldier named Fred Lee. Jack was astonished to learn that a Chinese Canadian kid named Fred Lee volunteered to fight for Canada during the first World War. "As a child who grew up in Canada and educated here, we never heard these stories"; says Jack. So, the engineer and entrepreneur went in search of Fred's story, and he created an award-winning documentary in the process.

Finding Fred Lee is told through Gins eyes as he journeys to Lee's hometown of Kamloops to uncover traces of this forgotten son. Lee was an honour roll student and the son of a pioneer businessman. He signed up with the Rocky Mountain Rangers at a time when Chinese Canadians couldn't vote. Most could not hold a traditional job. He left town on the CPR—the

railway that his father supplied with timbers and that thousands of Chinese men helped build. Lee survived Vimy with the 47<sup>th</sup> Battalion but was killed during the battle for Hill 70. The hill was captured but 1,877 Canadians lost their lives. His remains were never found.

The documentary takes viewers to a recently commemorated Hill 70 Memorial Park at Lens, France. A walkway emblazoned with maple leaves, named after Fred Lee, who is remembered on a panel dedicated to him. Jack Gin located Fred Lee's nephew, and the search continues for other family members. The film has screened in Kamloops, at the Canadian War Museum, and al the Asian Film Festival in Vancouver, and it has won the best short documentary award at the International Art Festival in Berlin. Private Fred Lee is no longer forgotten,

## MND Introduces Legislation to Modernize Military Justice System

The Minister of National Defence introduced legislation in an effort to modernize the military justice system and advance cultural change. *Canadian Military Family Magazine April 2024*

On March 21, 2024, Bill Blair, Minister of National Defence, introduced legislation to amend the National Defence Act (NDA), proposing targeted changes to modernize the military justice system. The proposed

amendment addresses eight recommendations: 2, 7, 8, 10, 13, 14, 15, and 16 from former Supreme Court Justice Fish's Third Independent Review of the National Defence Act report in 2020. The amendments also address recommendations made in independent and external reviews by former Supreme Court Justice Louise Arbour. "Members of the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) are always there to keep Canada safe – and it is also our obligation to keep them safe from harassment and misconduct. This landmark legislation would transform military justice in Canada and address external recommendations received by former Supreme Court of Canada Justices Arbour and Fish. Through these measures and our ongoing efforts, we will build a diverse, inclusive, and supportive institution that can attract and retain talented people across our country," said Blair in a press release.

Addressing Justice Arbour's Independent External Comprehensive Review Recommendation 5, the proposed legislation would definitively remove the CAF's jurisdiction to investigate and prosecute Criminal Code sexual offences committed in Canada. The proposed legislation

would provide exclusive jurisdiction to civilian authorities to investigate and prosecute such offences committed in Canada. "The introduction of this legislation reflects our commitment to maintaining the highest standards of accountability and fairness, crucial for the integrity of the military justice system. By modernizing our processes, we're strengthening the fundamental foundation of trust and confidence, which is indispensable for fostering discipline, efficiency, and morale within the CAF," said General Wayne Eyre, Chief of the Defence Staff. The legislation also seeks to expand the eligibility criteria for military judges to include non-

commissioned members, which the press release noted "would help diversify the pool of potential candidates." "The amendments aim to bolster the trust and confidence of Canadians in the military justice system," stated the press release.

Along with the amendments mentioned above, the proposed legislation seeks to amend the NDA further by:

- Excluding military judges from the summary hearing system and expanding access to Victim Liaison Officers, under the Declaration of Victims Rights, to individuals acting on behalf of a victim.
- Aligning sex offender information and publication ban provisions with the amendments made to the Criminal Code in An Act to amend the Criminal Code, the Sex Offender Information Registration Act and the International Transfer of Offenders Act. The amendments are necessary to ensure the military justice system remains constitutional and aligned with the Criminal Code and the civilian criminal justice system.

Section 273.601 of the NDA requires the Minister of National Defence to generate an Independent Review of specified provisions of the Act and its operation and present a report of the review to Parliament. The First Independent Review was by the late Right Honourable Antonio Lamer, retired Chief Justice of Canada (report tabled in 2003), and the Second Independent Review was by the Honourable Patrick LeSage, retired Chief Justice of the Ontario Superior Court of Justice (report tabled in 2012). The proposed amendment addresses eight recommendations: 2, 7, 8, 10, 13, 14, 15, and 16 from former Supreme Court Justice Fish's Third Independent Review of the National Defence Act report in 2020.

On November 5, 2020, Harjit S Sajjan, then Minister of National Defence, appointed former Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada Morris J Fish, as the Independent Review Authority (IRA) to conduct an Independent Review of specified provisions of the NDA, including those related to military justice, military policing and police oversight, military grievances and external review of grievances. The report contained 107 recommendations, most of which dealt with the military justice system, including how issues of sexual misconduct are addressed, military policing, and police oversight—the remainder of the recommendations concerned military grievances and the external review of grievances.

## The eight recommendations addressed in the proposed legislation include:

- **Recommendation** #2: The National Defence Act should be amended to allow the Governor in Council to appoint to the position of military judge anyone who is a barrister or advocate of at least 10 years' standing at the bar of a province and who has been an officer or a non-commissioned member of the Canadian Armed Forces, including the Reserve Force, for at least 10 years.
- **Recommendation** #7: The Director of Military Prosecutions and Director of Defence Counsel Services should be appointed by the Governor in Council, on the recommendation of the Minister of National Defence. The Director of Military Prosecutions and Director of

Defence Counsel Services should hold office during good behaviour for a term of seven years, subject to removal by the Governor in Council at any time for cause with the support of a resolution of the House of Commons to that effect. They should not be eligible to be reappointed for a further term of office.

- Recommendation #8: Subsections 165.17(3) to 165.17(6) of the National Defence Act should be repealed. If a power to issue directives in respect of a particular prosecution is to remain, this power should, at a minimum, be granted to the Minister of National Defence personally and not the Judge Advocate General. Any directive issued to the Director of Military Prosecutions should be required to be in writing and to be published in the Canada Gazette. The Minister of National Defence or the Director of Military Prosecutions should be authorized to direct that the publication be delayed at the latest until the completion of the prosecution or any related prosecution if either considers this delay to be in the interests of the administration of military justice.
- **Recommendation #10:** Section 9.2 of the National Defence Act should be amended to clarify the meaning of the Judge Advocate General's "superintendence of the administration of military justice in the Canadian Forces". At a minimum, the National Defence Act should expressly provide that the superintendence must respect the independence of military prosecutors, military defence counsel and other statutory actors within the military justice system.
- Recommendation #13: Section 18.3 of the National Defence Act should be amended to provide that the Canadian Forces Provost Marshal be appointed by the Governor in Council and hold office during pleasure. The Chief of the Defence Staff should accordingly have no authority to remove the Canadian Forces Provost Marshal. The Canadian Forces Provost Marshal should be responsible to the Minister of National Defence in the performance of his duties and functions. References to the Vice Chief of the Defence Staff in section 18.5 of the National Defence Act should consequently be replaced by references to the Minister of National Defence. Moreover, section 18.6 of the National Defence Act should be amended to provide that the Canadian Forces Provost Marshal report annually to the Minister of National Defence on the activities of the Canadian Forces Provost Marshal and the military police during the year.
- **Recommendation** #14: The National Defence Act should be amended to restyle the Canadian Forces Provost Marshal as the Provost Marshal General and to provide that the Canadian Forces Provost Marshal holds a rank that is not less than brigadier general.
- **Recommendation #15:** Subsections 18.5(3) to 18.5(5) of the National Defence Act should be repealed. For greater clarity, section 18.5 of the National Defence Act should be amended to provide that the general supervision and authority of the Vice Chief of the Defence Staff (or of the Minister of National Defence if Recommendation #13 is implemented) to issue general instructions or guidelines do not include a power to give directions regarding specific law enforcement decisions in individual cases.

• **Recommendation #16:** Subsection 250.19(1) of the National Defence Act should be amended to provide that "any person, including any officer or non-commissioned member, who believes on reasonable grounds that any officer or non-commissioned member or any senior official of the Department has improperly interfered with a policing duty or function" may make an interference complaint to the Military Police Complaints Commission.

## Blast Overpressure Getting Attention from US Lawmakers

A new bill demands more oversight for troops injured from heavy weapon blasts, TBIs and the Army is developing a tool for troops to check their blast exposure risk.

An Army reservist who killed 18 and wounded 13 in a mass shooting in Maine last October had signs of brain damage that likely came from blast overpressure — a little

understood form of long-term injury that soldiers can develop from firing heavy weapons. Now the physical and mental effects on troops exposed to blast overpressure from weapons are getting attention from the Army and Congress. Lawmakers introduced a bipartisan bill earlier this week called the "Blast Overpressure Safety Act" which directs the Department of Defense to enact new measures to mitigate, protect and treat injuries for service members exposed to blast overpressures from weapon systems. Research on repeated exposure to blast overpressure has linked the effects to impaired cognitive performance and decision-making ability, according to the Army's Medical Research and Development Command which is designing a tool to help troops understand their exposure risks.

Sen Angus King (I-Maine) said in a release that TBIs from explosive weapons are "common yet misunderstood." "In Maine, we know all too well the horrible tragedies that can occur, like in Lewiston, when TBIs are left untreated," King said. The legislation introduced in the Senate mandates regular neurocognitive assessments throughout troops' military careers, including baseline assessments before training. It also calls for blast overpressure and traumatic brain injury logs, data collection on brain injuries like related discharges, modifications to weapons to reduce blast exposure, training for high-risk troops on symptoms and mitigation techniques and

retaliation protections for servicemembers seeking care. The bill also calls for updating blast overpressure thresholds and the creation of a waiver system for those thresholds; mandatory training for medical and training personnel on blast overpressure, exposure and TBI; and expanding technologies for the Warfighter Brain Health Initiative pilot blast monitoring program. The impacts of blast exposures on troop's mental and physical health have slowly gained attention from lawmakers following the stand up of the Defense Health Agency's Traumatic Brain Injury Center of Excellence and reports from major news outlets have highlighted the psychological and physiological effects of continuous, unmitigated exposure to artillery weapon systems and blast injuries on American troops.

On the service side, the Army is developing a Blast Overpressure Tool to give troops firing heavy weapons like mortars, rockets, rifles and breaching rounds guidance on how to protect themselves from the high-pressure shock waves, also known as "blast overpressure." The tool will give users an estimate of the blast wave's radius and safety risks from a particular weapon by using a computer model of the training environment. An analysis of the reservists' brain tissue by Boston University researchers found evidence of traumatic brain injury which "likely played a role in his symptoms." Card's family said in a statement that while the brain analysis does not fully explain his actions nor provide a reason for the "horrific suffering he caused," they also said it helped them understand Card's brain damage and "how it may have impacted his mental health and behavior." Since 2000, nearly half a million troops have been diagnosed with TBIs from training During three months in 2023, the DOD treated or combat, according to the DOD. servicemembers nearly 50,000 times for TBIs which are considered the "signature wound" of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, Sen Susan Collins (R-Maine) said in a press release. For mild TBI, the most common diagnosis for American troops who served in Iraq and Afghanistan military, "the most important cause of brain injury was the long-term exposure to explosive weapons," according to researchers.

Beyond the last two decades, TBI diagnoses are growing among US troops stationed in Iraq and Syria for counter-terrorism operations who have been under rocket and ballistic missile attacks by Iranian-backed militias in the region since mid-October. Once the prototype Blast Overpressure Tool has been fully validated, the plan is to expand it to include all the high-priority weapon systems – shoulder mounted assault weapons, rifles and machine guns, howitzers, mortars and breaches. Researchers began developing the tool with a small business after they discovered inconsistent safety guidance for individual weapons across the services. The DOD's Blast Injury Research Coordinating Office is also creating a portable, pocket-sized flip book to illustrate the radius of blast overpressure zones of weapon systems and ammunition for crew members, observers and instructors and lists recommended personal protective equipment. Dr Raj Gupta, BIRCO's deputy director said the flip book will be useful for trainers and observers who are "potentially exposed to blast overpressure every time a Service Member fires their weapon" which for some that means several blast exposures each day. The flipbook began with data collected by Walter Reed Army Institute of Research on blast overpressure exposure during live fire training of four weapon systems: the shoulder fired M136 AT4 recoilless anti-tank weapon, the M120/M121 120mm mortar, the M107 and MK15 .50 caliber sniper rifles and breaching charges.

The data was collected by wearable sensors and high-fidelity stationary probes around the firing zone which was then turned into 3D simulations of blast exposures on human bodies and 2D maps of the blast radius with various pressures. The Army office has two patents for the exposure tool. The office is collaborating with the Army and Marine Corps to integrate the blast tool into the services' suite of geospatial applications which are used to plan safe range exercises since blast overpressure exposure mitigation is currently not addressed. Gupta has discovered gaps in the safety and mitigation procedures during the experimental phase of weapon development which are included in the federal legislation. The DOD does not require federal researchers or private contractors to measure blast overpressure as part of a given weapon system's research, testing and engineering and acquisition process. There is also zero data collection of exposure to blast overpressure on civilians or contractors during the development process. Blast exposure could also result in auditory injuries, according to research published in the Military Medicine journal by Gupta. The paper recommended that the DOD do more for blast exposure-related injuries like hearing loss, tinnitus, and central processing deficits and cited a 2021 Department of Veterans Affairs benefits report which had tinnitus and hearing loss as the most prevalent serviceconnected disability.

## **Hundreds of Satellites Give Military Faster Tactical Comms and Data**

NATIONAL HARBOR, Md. — A space-focused program spreading hundreds of small satellites in low orbit aims to bring clearer communications and faster data transfer in the

field to military units, a key to Marine Corps war-fighting needs. The Space Development Agency, a . and lower latency, or delays, meaning users can send more data faster. Ukraine has relied heavily on company SpaceX's commercial satellite Internet constellation Starlink to pass battlefield data throughout its war with Russia. The military version of the system is known as Starshield. Marines at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, began using the Starshield system recently, according to a March release. The system allowed Marines to maintain communications services when weather forced power outages that shut down base fiber and cloud cover interfered with other satellite communications, said Maj Tim Wrenn, 6<sup>th</sup> Marine Regiment communications officer.

During the September 2023 Archipelago Endeavor exercise, Marines used Starshield with the Swedish marines by mounting the device on a Swedish command and control boat. "Having high bandwidth, low latency services on a mobile maritime platform allowed US and Swedish Marines

to prosecute fire missions and provide reliable and relevant information throughout the battlespace," said Capt Quinn T Hemler, the assistant operations officer with 2nd Marine Division's G-6 communications. Marine Maj Gen Joseph Matos, commander of Marine Forces Cyber, said that satellite communications such as the Space Development Agency program enable both the crisis response mission of the Marine Corps and its ongoing Force Design changes that aims to better position the service for distributed, long-range operations. "(Force Design) is really talking about modernization, bringing in new technologies, such as (Proliferated Low Earth Orbit) how do we incorporate that into what we do every day and how we fight," Matos said. While missile tracking is crucial, most Marines using the satellites are likely to see improved communication and less down time between transmissions as they pass data in training and operations between various platforms.

The Space Development Agency had demonstrated Link 16 connectivity using its satellites, Marine Corps Times' sister publication C4ISRNET reported in November 2023. Link 16 is the tactical data link used by the US military, NATO and other partner nations to share tactical information such as text, voice and imagery. The Link 16 application uses the "transport layer," which is one of the layers that the Space Development Agency is developing along with the tracking, custody, navigation, support, emerging capabilities and battle management layers. Once deployed, the transport layer, which holds most of the program's satellites, will provide a mesh network of communications satellites that connect to each other and other space vehicles and ground stations, according to the Space Development Agency website. The next batch of satellites is planned for 2027 and another for 2029, by which time the network is expected to have "full global persistence" and resiliency, Tournear said. The program seeks to create a hybrid satellite terminal for troops to use. That would allow a user's terminal to switch between the low Earth orbit satellites transport layer or use dedicated military or commercial bandwidths such as the satellite communication Ka and Ku bands, respectively. The same terminal could also switch to use the Ka or Ku bands on MEO or GEO satellites. The system would work much like multiband radios can switch between frequency bands for a variety of communications options. Matos emphasized that while the low Earth orbit satellites program will give users new ways to communicate it still is only "part of the overall architecture." If Marines can't access those satellites for some reason, they need backup ways to conduct operations. "We don't own our own space assets," Matos said. "We use what industry provides. If that's not there then we have to look at other means of communication, single channel radio, troposphere, those are the systems we can control at the Marine Corps level."

## **Commemorative Banner Exhibit 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of D-Day and the Battle of Normandy**

Two months before his 19<sup>th</sup> birthday, and without his parent's knowledge, George Chow of British Columbia enlisted in the army. He served as a gunner during the Second World War and came ashore at Juno Beach after D-Day. George fought in the Normandy Campaign before joining the Allied advance through northwest France and into Belgium, the Netherlands and Germany. After the conflict, he served as a Gunnery instructor. "Once a gunner always a gunner." George rose to the rank of Warrant Officer II (Master Warrant Officer in today's army) and was a Battery

Sergeant Major when he was honourably discharged in 1963. George is featured, among others, in a Banner Exhibit honouring those who served on D-Day and during the Battle of Normandy, which is currently on display at the Visitor Education Centre, Canadian National Vimy Memorial in France until the middle of June.

Last Week: The Rockwell XFV-12 was a prototype supersonic United States Navy fighter



The XFV-12 design attempted to combine the Mach 2 speed and AIM-7 Sparrow armament of the McDonnell Douglas F-4 Phantom II in a VTOL (vertical takeoff and landing) fighter for the small Sea Control Ship which was under study at the time. On paper, it looked superior to the subsonic Hawker Siddeley Harrier attack fighter. However, it was unable to demonstrate an untethered vertical takeoff and its inability to meet performance requirements resulted in the program's termination.



## **80th Anniversary of Victory Tour**
