## Record Number of Army Cadets Expected on April 7 Vimy Day.

The 2013 Vimy Day Commemoration will be held on Sunday, April 7 at Victory Square commencing at 11:00 am. Up to ten wreaths will be placed at the Cenotaph in memory of the sacrifice of those who gave their lives in the service of their country at the Battle of Vimy Ridge which began 96 years ago on April 9 1917.

As Vimy Day is Recognition Day for Canada's Army Cadets no fewer than 12 Cadet Units from across Metro Vancouver are expected to participate at Victory Square. The commemoration date was moved to Sunday to accommodate an expected 300 Cadets for maximum attendance on Vimy Day.

The Cadet Parade Commander on April 7 will be C/CWO Jesse Johnson, RSM of Seaforth 1867 RCACC. In addition Cadets from various Vancouver units have been selected for sentry duty at the Cenotaph. A feature of Vimy Day this year will be the presence of the all-Cadet Vancouver Flag Party.

Wreaths will be placed by regimental associations from Metro Vancouver Regiments that perpetuate the original battalions involved in the Battle including the BC Regiment (DCO), 15<sup>th</sup> Field Artillery Regiment RCA, Seaforth Highlanders of Canada and the Royal Westminster Regiment.

Other wreaths will be placed by the Royal United Services Institute – Vancouver, Royal Canadian Legion, the Army, Navy & Air Forces Veterans, Veterans Affairs Canada, the Royal

Canadian Army Cadet League (BC Branch), 39 Canadian Brigade Group and the Consulate of France.

Serving members, Veterans, youth and the general public are welcome at this significant commemoration of a WW 1 battle that became a turning point in Canada's history. The Vimy Day ceremony at Victory Square begins at 11:00 am ending at approximately 11:30 am.

## **Professor Dominick Graham**

#### 11 Mar 2013

Professor Dominick Graham, who has died aged 92, was the co-author of a classic work on artillery in the two world wars.



Dominick ('Toby') Graham served with the British Armed Forces during World War II as a member of the Royal Artillery. He was Mentioned in Despatches and awarded the Military Cross in 1945, retiring with the rank of Major

Graham's collaborator was Brigadier Shelford Bidwell, whom he first met in the bar at Sandhurst after a lively seminar discussing whether massed artillery had

caused a deadlock on the Western Front. A publisher standing alongside them commissioned them to produce a book. Graham lived in Canada, Bidwell in England, and having to exchange chapters by post was a complication. But they never fell out, and managed to meet when Graham was in England on vacation from the University of New Brunswick, where he was director of military history. Their book Fire-Power (1982) described the evolution in military thinking from the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. Tracing developments in training, machine guns, wireless and air power, they showed how, in the First World War, skilfully directed artillery was not just an extra wheel in the war machine but a vital element when used in conjunction with other arms. The authors followed this highly original work with Tug of War (1986), a lively narrative of the Italian campaign from 1943 to 1945 which contained vivid biographical sketches of the commanders and drew on Graham's personal examination of the terrain at Monte Cassino. Their last joint effort was Coalitions, Politicians and Generals (1993), in which Graham did the bulk of the writing and Bidwell, as editor, drew on his experience as deputy director of the Royal United Services Institute. They offered a stimulating commentary on the British, French and German staff systems, and compared the political pressure applied by Lloyd George on Haig and by General George Marshall on Eisenhower.

Dominick Stuart Graham was born into a naval and military family on July 24 1920. Always known as "Toby" (because when he was a baby his family thought he looked like the dog in Punch and Judy), he went to Bradfield and then the Royal Military Academy Woolwich. In 1940 he was sent to Narvik to command an anti-aircraft battery; he was wounded while

rescuing a gun detachment on an airfield during an air raid. Graham next commanded the same guns during the Battle of Britain at Dover. Eighteen months later he was on patrol outside Tobruk in North Africa when his observation car was hit, and he plodded through the desert for two days in the desert before being captured.

His first attempt to escape — through a sewer, from Chieti camp in Italy — was foiled by a fire. Soon he was transferred to Fontanellato, from which he got out for a day, only to be caught at a railway station. On being freed after the Italian armistice in September 1943, he set out to join up with the Allied armies.

In Escapes and Evasions of an Obstinate Bastard (2000), Graham described how he wore peasants' clothes and a scarecrow's hat while walking for six weeks around and over steep mountains, lodging in barns and shepherds' huts while being fed by Italian sympathisers. He was fired at several times by Germans scouring the woods for food and escapers before finally being escorted with a party of 17 by a drunken guide to a village near Ortona, where a Canadian patrol found him being shaved in a barber's chair.

On February 16 1945 Graham was commanding a battery with the Guards Armoured Division in north-west Europe when he went forward to replace a wounded forward observation officer shortly before an enemy counterattack. As the German pounding increased, he received a shell splinter in his arm, but continued to direct defensive fire on his wireless, reporting his injury only after the first attack had been repelled. When a relief officer failed to reach him, he refused to be evacuated for four hours. The citation for his MC declared that his disregard for his safety, and his calmness while giving concise orders under heavy fire, enabled more enemy counterattacks to be repelled and a successful thrust to be made by the 5<sup>th</sup> Coldstreams. After the war Graham became an instructor at Sandhurst, a staff officer in Germany with 6<sup>th</sup> Armoured Division and commanded the first British missile battery. He was also a member of the British cross-country skiing team at the Winter Olympics at Cortina in 1956. Then, fed up with peacetime soldiering, he emigrated to New Brunswick, where he started a cross-country ski club, fished for salmon on the Miramichi River and shot partridge in the woods.

His first job was as a maths teacher at St John High School. But his keen military interest led him to take a degree in History at the University of New Brunswick and then earn a PhD at London University before joining the staff at UNB, where his initiative in demonstrating the relevance of history to sceptical Canadian bureaucrats led to the founding of the Centre for Conflict Studies in 1980. He could be withering with anyone who had never looked down the sights of a 77mm artillery piece.

His other books included a small work on Monte Cassino (1970) and The Price of Command (1993), a life of Guy Simonds, Canada's most distinguished general. After the break-up of Graham's first marriage, to Valerie Greig (with whom he had two daughters), he resigned his academic post. He was 17,000ft up K2 in the Himalayas the day he was appointed professor emeritus. Graham then married his childhood sweetheart, Mary Hawson, and settled in Yorkshire to work on her family estate and gardens. When she died he took a container ship to visit his daughter in New Zealand; the only other passenger was Ursula Behringer, and they married in 2002.

Every year Graham went to London for the annual lunch of the San Martino Trust, which brings 20 young Italians to Britain in thanks for the wartime aid given to Allied escapers. When he was no longer able to make the journey he alarmed friends by vanishing from his Co Durham care home, but was eventually found lunching at the Army and Navy Club in London. ## Hundreds of UN Syrian Golan UN observers scramble to safety in Israel

The flight of hundreds of UN Disengagement and Observers Force (UNDOF) soldiers - Indian, Austrian and Filipino - in trucks and APCs from the Syrian side of Golan into Israel was in full swing early Monday, March 11. DEBKA*file* quotes them as telling Israeli officers manning the Israeli side of the enclave that their commanders urged them to get out when they could because "We can no longer vouch for your safety."

Many more UN troops are expected to make their way during the day to refuge in IDF camps across the border. Their officers, they said, had already placed their belongings aboard waiting vehicles ready to move across as soon as they received permission from their governments in Vienna, New Delhi and Manila or the UN Secretariat in New York. Our military sources report that this mass exit signals the breakup of the 1,000-strong UNDOF which for 39 years manned the 8 sq km separation zone between Syria and Israel. It was set up in 1974 to end the war of attrition fought in the sequel to the Yom Kippur War between the IDF and Cuban armoured brigades flown in from Angola by the Soviet Union to support the Syrian army.

The UN force's collapse began with the Croatian government's recall of its 100 troops last week.

As the peacemakers flee, Russia is today hardly likely to interfere with who gets to control the Golan separation zone which was split between Syria and Israel.

DEBKA*file* reports three potential candidates are eying the sliver of land for different reasons:

1. The Martyrs of Yarmuk Islamist militia force of the Syrian rebel movement, which staked its claim last week by kidnapping 21 blue-and-white helmeted Filipino observers on the Golan and later releasing them in Jordan.

It is feared in Washington, Jerusalem and Amman that Al Qaeda-associated forces will waste no time in overrunning the highly strategic patch of Golan borderland, armed with chemical weapons and even Scud D missiles captured from Syrian army bases. They may even be plotting an attack during President Barack Obama's visits to Jerusalem and Amman, starting March 20.

DEBKA*file*'s military sources report that in sync with the UN observers' escape, Israeli military reinforcements are massing on the Golan Syrian border.

2. US, Jordan and/or Israel may step in to keep the Islamists out, using either large Special Forces units for ground raids or a swarm of armed drones.

3. Hezbollah militia units were spotted Sunday night on the move from south Lebanon toward the Lebanese-Syrian border areas abutting on the Golan separation zone.

### **Government of Canada Announces New Social Security Tribunal**

Announced in Canada's Economic Action Plan 2012, the Social Security Tribunal (SST) will eliminate duplication in appeal and tribunal services for major federal social security programs. It will be an administrative tribunal with quasi-judicial powers and will provide an independent appeal process for government decisions on Employment Insurance (EI), the Canada Pension Plan (CPP) and Old Age Security (OAS).

33 Canadians from across Canada have been appointed to the Tribunal, effective March 15, 2013. Appointed from BC are: Andrea Schloegl, *Vancouver*, Virginia Lee Saunders, *Vancouver* and R Grant Smith, *Richmond*.
