<u>CWGC Presentation – 1300hrs 7 Nov 2018</u>

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission presentation by Dominique Boulais, the Commemorations and External Relations Manager for Canada, will consist of a brief history, a description of our fundamental principles and its mandate and worldwide responsibilities; it will describe the responsibilities of the Commission's Canadian Agency within the Americas while emphasising its work in BC. It will also explain the importance of commemoration and the discovery of remains.

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission was established by Royal Charter on 21 May 1917. Its duties are to mark and maintain the graves of the forces of the Commonwealth who died in the two world wars, to build and maintain memorials to the dead whose graves are unknown, and to keep records and registers. The Canadian Agency of the Commission is responsible for fulfilling the Charter tasks in the Americas (including the Caribbean). This includes the care of 20,400 War Dead commemorated in 3,350 cemeteries and on ten memorials.

A Special Tribute on the 100th Anniversary of the End of the First World War Mountainview Cemetery – Vancouver, BC November 10th to November 11th

On Saturday November 10th our 24-hour commemoration of the Great War Armistice will begin with a special ceremony at 3:00pm. We will place 6,000 hand made Poppies at the graves of 4,000 veterans who are interred at Vancouver's Mountainview Cemetery. Each poppy represents a serviceman or women from British Columbia that died in the First World War. Our commemoration will continue with the lighting of 100 candles. The event will then become an all-night solemn vigil with uniformed sentry standing guard amongst a field of poppies and sacred presence of 4,000 veterans. Our tribute to our fallen will culminate on November 11th with a small informal gathering to remember. The commemoration is expected to end on November 11th at 3:00pm.

Fake-Looking Air Force Photo Is Real, And Totally Amazing

The photo was floating around among some doubters on Instagram, which is where we spotted it. Those with a keen eye and even a cursory knowledge of the M4 rifle will immediately wonder, why is that shell casing in front of the barrel? Normally, when an M4 fires, the spent brass is ejected to the right and rear of the shooter, at anywhere between 3 and 4 o'clock. But in this case, the brass was ejecting forward. Which is weird as all hell. We reached out to the photographer, Airman 1st Class Andrew Sarver, who assured us that yes, it's legit. The photo was shot last month during range training with a K-9 unit at Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada, and part of a larger gallery he directed us to on DVIDS. "The M4 we were using had been ejecting brass forward (at about a 2-3 o'clock position) throughout the entire exercise," Sarver told Task & Purpose. "From what I've been told, the M4 can sometimes do that when there is too much gas pressure. I just had great timing with capturing the shell at the exact rotation and elevation with the barrel!"

That's actually true. A Google search for "can AR brass eject forward?" yields plenty of people asking why it's happening to them, with helpful gun aficionados offering myriad reasons. Among them is brass hitting the brass deflector, or more often than not, too much gas. It's not a huge problem for the shooter, but it can cause a weird ejection, while resulting in more wear and tear to the rifle. "The photo is definitely real, the timing was just impeccable," Staff Sgt Matthew Gluyas, the airman in the photograph, told Task & Purpose. "Some people were trying to say I shot the casing out of the barrel or we photoshopped it to make it look like that but that was definitely not the case." Besides those explanations, we also looked at the metadata on his photo and it didn't offer any clear tells that it was Photoshopped. And among Sarver's gallery was another picture taken from a different angle, which showed brass going forward instead of where it normally belongs.

A Canadian rifle team member said, "When I competed at the Canadian National finals, our coach would arrange to have 2 loops clipped off the extraction spring. As long as the casings landed at 2 o'clock (if the muzzle was at 12) then the C7 would never jam. Over 4000 fired per rifle, times 20 guys, and zero jams."

Type 26 Named as the Design for Canada's Future Warship

The Type 26 Global Combat Ship

Irving Shipbuilding and Public Services and Procurement Canada have announced that BAE-Lockheed Martin is the industry team which scored the highest with their bid to provide the 15 new

warships for the Royal Canadian Navy. The consortium is the "preferred bidder" according to the federal government, for the Canadian Surface Combatant program. Its design is the Type 26. That selection will now set off negotiations which in turn will – if all is successful – produce a contract. The entire project is worth \$60 billion, with an estimated 60 per cent for the actual ship

The Type 26 frigate is a class of frigate currently being built for the Royal Navy. The ship design and manufacture program is known as the Global Combat Ship and will be a multimission warship designed to support anti-submarine warfare, air defence and general purpose operations.

One Headstone at a Time

Behind a quest to document NL military gravesites CBC News · Oct 09, 2018

For retired Major Michael Pretty, the Trail of the Caribou Research Group project is personal. The group has spent a decade or more documenting gravesites of Newfoundlanders who served, whether it was in the Royal Newfoundland Regiment, the Canadian army, the medical corps, or even in other countries' armies — six at last count. Pretty has direct connections that make the research resonate that much more. "I had some family members from Newfoundland killed in the First World War. Forty others from England, with my last name, were killed in the First World War, 24 in the Second World War," Pretty told CBC's *On the Go*.

Pretty himself spent 30 years in the military, and overseas deployments always included visits to fellow soldiers' graves wherever they were. But it was when he was walking through a cemetery in Newfoundland that he saw a headstone that referred to a man's son who

never came home from the war. "So I said, 'I wonder how many of those are around?' So we're at about 700 of those now," he said. "I found a headstone that said, 'To so-and-so that served in the Canadian army,' so I said, 'Hmmm, I wonder how many served in the Canadian army?'" Those headstone memorials aren't under any other group's purview to look after, said Pretty. "So for example, Commonwealth War Graves, they look after the war dead. The Last Post Fund, if you're a known veteran, when it was created, well, they look after veterans' graves or help families with veterans' funerals. But who maintains those?" Hence, the Trail of the Caribou group's goal to raise awareness of the accomplishments and the sacrifices of Newfoundlanders and Labradorians in military conflicts and peacekeeping missions over the past century. "When I went to school here, in Benoit's Cove, out on the west coast, nobody talked about Newfoundland history. I think we're at that point in time where if we don't start recording this stuff, and don't start recording where they're buried and looking after their final resting places, it's going to be lost."

Pretty knows it's a big job, with a list of soldiers some 13,000 names deep, a project that he knows he realistically might not see completed. "It will never be finished," he said. But many hands make light work, and the not-for-profit group, which started with a core of about 15 people and now has about 70, is recruiting volunteers to help. "What I'd like to see is different groups around the province looking after areas in the province and doing



research, towns approaching us on where we can help, where we can fundraise," he said. Thursday night in St John's, the group shared stories about some the soldiers they've learned about, with a fundraiser to come Nov 15. "There's all kinds of neat stories," he said.

The Trail of the Caribou group recently found, in England, the grave of Royal Newfoundland Regiment Pte Walter Scammell of Change Islands, who died of influenza caught while on an officers' training course. Scammell was training for the Royal Flying Corps but died Nov 11, 1918 — the same day the armistice ending the First World War was signed. In May, the group replaced the headstone of Edward Baldwin of Pouch Cove. The headstone was also a memorial to Baldwin's three sons, who all died, fighting for three different militaries in three different First World War battles, and the town had a ceremony to mark the occasion. "It was a community event, and for that hour and a half, those three brothers were remembered in that town," he said. "So that's why it's important to me."

Tracing the growth of the Canadian Chaplain Service from its chaotic and controversy-ridden early days to its maturation as an efficient field force, Duff Crerar highlights both the role of the Service on the battlefield and the personal experiences of the chaplains. Refuting the widely held view that chaplains serving overseas were cloistered from front-line realities, Crerar describes the padres' experiences in camps, hospitals, and on the battlefield. He examines how they maintained their faith in the face of death and destruction, and explores the bonds forged between chaplains and troops.



Duff Crerar taught Indigenous, social and military history at Grande Prairie Regional College prior to his retirement in 2013. He helped to organize an oral history project among First Nations and Métis in the Peace River region and has co-edited a book on Treaty 8. He spent 25 years consulting with the Royal Canadian Chaplain Service and was called upon frequently to provide expert advice and education for the service. He is an elder at the Grande Prairie Church of Christ.
