Queen Receives a Maquette of Canadian Soldier and Poet John McCrae


The Queen receives a maquette of a statue of Canadian Lt Col John McCrae, best known for writing the famous war memorial poem "In Flanders Fields".

The Queen, Captain General, The Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery, received Brigadier General James Selbie (Colonel Commandant,

The Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery) at Buckingham Palace. The General presented Her Majesty with a maquette of the statue of Lt Col John McCrae (1872-1918): Canadian Gunner, Physician & Poet, and author of "In Flanders Fields". In May 2015, the statue of Lt Col McCrae by Ruth Abernathy, was erected in Ottawa. McCrae is dressed as an artillery officer, with his medical bag nearby, as he writes. The statue shows the destruction of the battlefield and, at his feet, the poppies which are a symbol of Remembrance of World War I and all armed conflict since.

15th Field Artillery Regiment Honours Shield

It was announced in this publication after Canada's mission to Afghanistan ended in 2014 that British Columbia Infantry and Armoured units would be receiving Theatre Honours. For the Artillery, Engineers and the Special Operations Regiment, their service in Afghanistan would be acknowledged in their shared motto 'UBIQUE'. Although the colours (Guns) and 'UBIQUE' reflect the common history of The Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery, I felt that the soldiers and 15th Field were not being fully recognized for their long service in that country

which went from 2004-2013. In the spring of 2014, I approached the Commanding Officer, LCol Brent Purcell CD AdeC, with a historical project that would not only display our service to that mission but also present our service since 1920. An 'HONOURS SHIELD' that would proudly show all the Regiment's service on the west wall of the armoury overlooking the parade square. It would not just recognize the service of our members to Afghanistan but also service in the Second World War, Peacekeeping Operations, NATO Operations and Domestic Operations. It would be a clear record that would allow visiting family members, friends of the Regiment, guests and members of other units to see our service to Canada in a glance.

The project started with a visit to the museum followed by historical research. As part of the process, a preliminary paper Honours Shield was put out for display for members to view, comment on and discuss for over a year. With museum support from MGen McDonald CMM CD (ret'd) and John Redmond, the missions and dates were verified as correct. Bdr Albert Law, a photographer and graphic designer, was hired to produce a visually appropriate design. After many revisions and edits, the final design was ready. Now, how to fund and mount a 10 x 5 foot aluminum sign? After getting four initial quotes for tender, one stood out and received the contract. The 15th Field Regimental Society stood up and funded brushed aluminum standoffs that would bring the Honours Shield off the wall. On Wednesday, September 28th, the Shield was installed. It should be clear that it was the Commanding Officer's vision and steadfastness, through a process that lasted two and a half years, that the project came to a successful and fulfilling end. The Honours Shield can be viewed from the parade square. It is on the west wall above the clock.

Army Tests New Warfighting Tech at Army Warfighting Assessment

FORT BLISS, Texas (Army News Service) -- The first full "Army Warfighting Assessment," AWA 17.1, kicked off here Monday. The two-week exercise is meant to gather feedback from Soldiers on the performance of new warfighting capabilities like robotics systems and autonomous weapons systems in a life-like combat situation, according to Maj Gen Terry McKenrick, commander of the Army's Brigade Modernization Command. "How well do these capabilities perform?" he said during a media day Friday, describing the questions the AWA is intended to answer. "Do they meet the requirements? Are the requirements right? Is there a way to make this capability better?"

Participants in AWA 17.1 include Soldiers from the regular Army, Army National Guard, and Army Reserve, as well as soldiers from the United Kingdom, Australia, Canada, Denmark and Italy. During the AWA, Soldiers will implement 41 concepts and capabilities designed to meet 20 "warfighting challenges" posited by the Army. The exercise will be stopped three times so the Soldiers can provide insight on how the new capabilities helped or hindered the execution of their mission. McKenrick said the feedback will be analyzed by the Brigade Modernization Command. "We determine some findings and recommendations; we then brief that through a series of governance forms, and then it goes up to the Department of the Army, where senior leaders ... can prioritize and make decisions," he said. In some cases, the new capabilities will be fielded to the Army; in others, improvements will be called for; and in still others, the capability will be judged ineffective or incapable of meeting the capability gap for which it was designed.

Capabilities being assessed at AWA 17.1 include unmanned aerial systems, including the micro UAS, a "leader-follower" capability that is meant to increase the safety of convoy operations by limiting the number of drivers needed for vehicles. The Army defines the 20 "warfighting challenges" that new capabilities like the micro UAS are meant to answer as "enduring first-

order problems, the solutions to which [will] improve the combat effectiveness of the current and future force." "We vet every concept and capability for [network integration evaluations and AWAs] against those warfighting challenges, making sure we're focused on solving the highest priority problems and gaps affecting our Army," McKenrick said. In the past, the Army conducted an array of NIEs, 11 in all, at a rate of two per year. Such evaluations are meant to determine how well equipment works within the existing Army network. That's not the goal of the AWA, McKenrick said. Its purpose is to examine how new concepts and capabilities integrate into the war fight, rather than whether equipment works on the Army network.

The AWA also brings in multi-

national partners -- because the Army doesn't fight alone, McKenrick said. The AWA is meant to further develop interoperability in a joint, interorganizational, and multinational environment -- one of the 20 warfighting challenges. The AWA 17.1 is the first AWA, which is being held this year instead of an NIE. According to McKenrick, the Army will



host one AWA and one NIE each year, in lieu of two NIEs a year. In July the Army will host NIE 17.2 at Fort Bliss. The Army already has plans for AWA 18.1 and NIE 18.2; as well as AWA 19.1 and NIE 19.2.

Airborne Gunner History Project

As some of you may be aware LCol (Ret'd) Brian Reid has undertaken to author a history of Canadian Airborne Gunners. The intent is to produce an illustrated, high quality, hard covered product covering the years from the initiation of the concept in 1942 through to the current time.

An issue has arisen with the production of the final chapter or chapters. Although a few individuals have responded, it appears there is an information gap relating to this more modern era — from circa 1982 to 1993 as well as subsequent airborne gunner activities in the current century. To produce a well rounded text the perspective of all ranks is most welcome and encouraged. The type of information needed relates activities and experiences for both field and air defence in the airborne role, as well as related aspects pertaining to the more recent reintroduction to mortars and the establishment of the observation batteries.

CF Base to Host Tests on LAVs Destined for Saudi Arabia

The Canadian military plans to open up one of its principal bases to help a major defence contractor validate design changes and quality assurance on light armoured vehicles destined for Saudi Arabia, CBC News has learned. National Defence quietly agreed to the plan last year and signed a provision of service agreement, according to documents obtained under Access to Information legislation. In January, the country's top military commander, Gen Jonathan Vance, signed an additional document — known as a tasking order — which put the wheels in motion for the trials and evaluation, which is supposed to take place at Canadian Forces Base Wainwright in Alberta. At least one opposition party and an outspoken critic of the sale say the Liberal government has crossed a threshold, going from passive to active support of the sale. The engineering validations are being conducted on the mammoth LAV VI, an updated and more lethal version of the LAV III, which was the Canadian Army's principal fighting vehicle during the Afghan war.

The tests, which are to be conducted by the manufacturer General Dynamics Land Systems Canada at its own expense, have yet to take place, according to a government official familiar with the file. They had been expected to happen earlier this year, but were postponed, said the source, who was not authorized to speak on the record. A spokesman for General Dynamics would only say the company is carrying out "routine product testing" for its customers and there will be no cost to Canadian taxpayers. "We do not comment on specific schedules or programs," said Doug Wilson-Hodge, the company's manager of corporate affairs in an email. The service agreement is slated to expire at the end of year, but documents quietly tabled in the Senate last summer show defence officials are expected to begin negotiating the next phase sometime this fall.

National Defence would not comment on the arrangement other than to say the army "can and does grant access to bases and training areas, and provided administrative/logistics support" for contractors under agreements that provide for "full cost recovery." Officials at International Trade requested the army help the company, the documents say. The Liberal government has insisted it cannot cancel the \$15-billion sale to Saudi Arabia, despite the country's human rights record and growing concern about the kingdom's war against Houthi rebels in neighbouring Yemen. But critics charge that by allowing the engineering tests to take place on a Canadian base, the Liberals have gone from reluctantly rubber-stamping a deal brokered by the

Conservatives to actively facilitating its completion. "Why is the Canadian government involved in the first place?" asked Peggy Mason, head of the Rideau Institute, a non-profit foreign policy advocacy group. "It's troubling that the Canadian government is inserting itself so directly and is facilitating so directly an arms deal that runs directly contrary to Canadian arms export regulations, and runs directly contrary to the very strong view of the majority of Canadians who don't want Canada complicit in serious human rights abuses abroad through our sale of military equipment to countries denounced as among the worst of the worst human rights abusers."

Foreign Affairs Minister Stéphane Dion and International Trade Minister Chrystia Freeland have at various times raised the prospect of cancellation penalties, lost jobs and damage to the country's business reputation if the deal were to be sidelined. "We'll review the process by which these contracts are assessed in the future," Dion told CBC's Power & Politics last January. "But what is done is done and the contract is not something we'll revisit." But NDP foreign affairs critic Hélène Laverdière says the narrative that the government cannot revisit or undo the deal is slowly unravelling. She pointed to Dion's signing of export permits last spring, a formality that allowed the deal to proceed. "He gave the go-ahead. He gave the green light," Laverdière said. "So, you cannot and the government cannot put the blame on the Conservative government. The Conservatives started it and the Liberals just continue basically the same policy." The engineering tests should not be allowed to proceed on Canadian government property and there should be a suspension of the agreement that allows for a proper assessment, she added. It is not the first time National Defence has been involved in the controversial sale. In response to a question posed before a Senate committee last year, the department acknowledged it had signed a deal with General Dynamics Land Systems to support testing of the LAV VI prototype in the kingdom's capital of Riyadh in 2011. One soldier took part in a demonstration of the vehicle's capabilities as part of the sales pitch.

The photo was probably taken in the Summer of 1931, when the Trimotor toured across Canada as the "mother ship" with the RCAF Siskin aerobatic demonstration team as part of the Trans-Canada


Air Pageant. It was sold in 1937 to Grant McConachie's Yukon Southern Air Transport as CF-BEP.

This Week: This week we feature a theme that is naval. The photo comes to us via our old friend Capt Bob Spring. It was taken by his father around 1930 whilst working for Canadian Pacific Steamships. The scanning of the album was one of my retirement joys, it having so many evocative photos from that long-lost era of ocean liners, a time when Canada was a nautical name, and not just a cruise ship destination. The photo was taken in Hong Kong, at the Whampoa Docks, where CP steamers used to be refitted. The area was redeveloped in the 1980s, and will likely be re-redeveloped soon again, given the region's great need for housing, and the removal, post Kai Tak Airport, of building height restrictions. However, part of the 1980s-development included a shopping centre in the shape of a ship, a reminder of the region's history (they also dug up some interesting artillery pieces, one of which is mounted by the aforementioned nautical mall).



However, font of knowledge that we are about the former colony, that brilliance disappears when anything salt-water related appears. The author is aware that this vessel is a submarine (or, submersible), and that the boat belonged to the

Royal Navy. Beyond that, and given that my only book on the RN in Hong Kong is in storage, we would very much appreciate if some of you nautically knowledgeable Jack (and Jill) Tars could help us identify the boat. Also, why was it in Hong Kong in the era of gun boats?



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
Veterans' Week Fundraising Luncheon Supporting the "Vimy 2017 Project"




