## **World War 2 - 1941**

John Thompson Strategic analyst quotes from his book "Spirit Over Steel"

**Dec 27<sup>th</sup>:** PM Curtin declares that "Australia looks to America for protection", but Manila looks to Open-City status to protect itself. More British commandos land in Lofotens; they depart after a successful raid with 250 Norwegian volunteers. The eagerness of Norwegian volunteers for Allied service is embarrassing to the Germans and there will be repercussions for the families of the volunteers.

**Dec 28<sup>th</sup>:** German assault troops make headway against the ring of forts around Sevastopol. The Japanese force withdraws in both Luzon and Malaya. The American, British, Dutch and Australian (ABDA) joint command for Southeast Asia is established.

**Dec 29<sup>th</sup>:** British armor takes some losses near Benghazi from a quick German counter-attack. 51<sup>st</sup> and 54<sup>th</sup> Soviet Armies make additional landings on the Crimea, forcing a redeployment of the Germans around Sevastopol.

Dec 30<sup>th</sup>: US and Filipino Troops fall back to their last holding positions to complete the withdrawal of Leyte's defenders into the Bataan Peninsula. This withdrawal is superbly

conducted and is part of an initial strategy for the defence of the Philippines; but many supplies have been neglected and the premise of an immediate relief effort is faulty indeed. The Soviets liberate Tula and the Volkhov Front has rolled the Germans near Tikhvin back to their starting positions. The Japanese on Malaya are nearly along a line between Kampar-Kuantan.

**Dec 31**<sup>st</sup>: Since June 22<sup>nd</sup>, the Soviets have lost 5,000,000 men dead and wounded, 3,000,000 have been taken prisoner while 20,000 tanks and 30,000 artillery pieces are lost – but they are still full of fight as their continuing offensives west of Moscow make clear. Nowhere are they penetrating German lines today, but the attrition of German manpower and resources is more than the Wehrmacht can bear in the future even if they are causing more casualties to the Red Army than they are receiving themselves.

# 1942: The Year of Turning

Thus far, the war is mostly going the way the Axis wants it to go. The Japanese are rampaging through the Pacific achieving the impossible almost everywhere and seemingly unstoppable. Despite the reverses before Moscow, Hitler knows his forces are superior in terms of tactics, technology and operational art to anything the Soviets can assemble. He remains the master of Europe and is able to pursue some of his pet projects such as escalating the genocide of the Jews. Even the Italians find their forces are slowly improving and becoming more proficient although they are hungrier for resources than either Germany or Japan.

Everything seems possible now in the first half of this year. The capture of the Suez Canal can be achieved. Britain can be starved out by the U-Boats as Allied shipping losses outstrip their ability to build more. It may be possible to link up with the Japanese somewhere in Asia and chase the Soviets to the Ural Mountains. For the Japanese, surely the United States and Britain will sue for peace but it has been so easy to beat them so far that this might be unnecessary, even unwelcome, and glittering new prizes seem in reach in all directions. For the Axis, all it will take for total victory is to push a bit harder, to reach a bit more. That heroic extra effort to grasp victory will be rewarded. Meanwhile, standing to lathes in frozen fields as new factories are constructed around them, teenagers, women and old men are building tanks and guns for their fathers, husbands and sons now fighting for Holy Mother Russia in the Red Army. It has now become clear that the Nazis just don't hate the Communists; they hate the Russian people themselves. For ordinary Russians, the war is about more than ideology, it is about survival.

The Axis leaders might despise the Americans as soft, indolent and decadent. Yet Americans are lining up in the millions to volunteer for war; abandoning the comforts of home for Spartan barracks and the tender ministrations of shrieking drill instructors. For them, dealing with Germany and Italy will be business but settling accounts with the Japanese will be a pleasure. Britain and the Dominions have now harnessed all their strength, will and ingenuity with the full confidence that they are no longer alone. War winning weapons are starting to come off the production lines and the men who will have to learn how to use them are now being trained.

There have been too many defeats and some more to come but the down payments on victories are being made.

This is the year everything turns.

### January 1942: The 'Final Solution' is Implemented

**General:** A grim year looms for the Allies in the Atlantic, 91 U-boats are operational and 158 more are on the way. This month 110 Allied ships with a total displacement of 419,000 tons will be sunk or captured around the world. The RAF will bomb Bremen, Brest, Emden and Hamburg this month, and the Axis will hammer Malta continually to restrict its ability to interfere with African supply routes. Even before the implementation of the 'Final Solution' the mass murder of European Jews is well underway, this month in the Warsaw Ghetto alone 5,123 will die from disease and starvation.

**Jan 1<sup>st</sup>:** Representatives from 26 nations meet in Washington to endorse the Atlantic Charter; the signatory countries call themselves the United Nations. German troops stage a counter-offensive towards Kerch in the Crimea; the Kalinin Front recaptures Staritza. Jean Moulin is parachuted back into France with directions to unify all the French Resistance groups and make them loyal to de Gaulle.

**Jan 2<sup>nd</sup>:** Manila is now in Japanese hands. The Soviet West Front captures Maroyaroslavets to the south of Moscow. The Axis garrison trapped in Bardia since the start of Operation Crusader surrenders.

#### **Return to Vimy: Tour Itinerary**

Day 1 – 1 April ... Depart Canada for Paris.

Day 2 - 2 April ...We arrive in Paris, meet our bus and then drive to Normandy where we will visit Juno Beach and the Juno Beach Centre. We will stay in Caen tonight.

Day 3 - 3 April ... Today we will start with a visit to Benysur-Mer cemetery to honour the Gunners there. We will then visit Verrières Ridge where the Corps Artillery was first deployed.

Day 4 – 4 April ... Departing Caen we will head for Dieppe. Though not a specific Gunner battle, many gunners landed on the beach with the infantry and a UK gunner earned the VC. We will tour the beach and museum and stay in a local hotel.

Day 5 – 5 April.... We will make an early start from Dieppe and drive to Ypres where we will look at the battles of 1915 around St. Julien and 1917 around Passchendaele. We will participate in the Menin Gate ceremony that evening and stay in Ypres.

Day 6 – 6 April ... Today we will visit the Somme. Starting with Beaumont-Hamel we will then tour the Courcellette battlefield before heading to Arras where we will stay for the next four nights.

**Day 7 – 7 April** ... We will tour the battlefield of Vimy Ridge before attending the Freedom of the City of Arras parade that will be held today. Day 8 - 8 April ... Today we will parade at the Gunner Memorial in Thélus on Vimy Ridge and rededicate it to the memory of Gunners who fell in this important battle.

Day 9 – 9 April ... This day will be the big event as we attend the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary ceremonies marking the capture of Vimy Ridge. Thousands of Canadians (including notable VVIPs) and French citizens will throng the memorial park to witness this historic event.

Day 10 – 10 April ... We will depart early to make flights from Paris that will return us to Capada.
