World War 2 - 1942

John Thompson Strategic analyst - quotes from his book "Spirit Over Steel"

Mar 29th: An effective RAF raid with 234 bombers on Lubeck infuriates Hitler into ordering the "Baedeker Raids" on British cities. A Murmansk convoy is engaged, without success, by German surface vessels. British troops in Burma stage an attack to relieve Stilwell's Chinese at Toungoo.

Mar 30th: The Joint Chiefs of Staff carve the Pacific into Nimitz's Pacific Zone and MacArthur's Southwest Pacific Zone.

Mar 31st: The Chinese depart Toungoo with the Japanese in lukewarm pursuit. Admiral Somerville slips his ships out of Ceylon to avoid an upcoming Japanese carrier raid. The

Soviets posthumously award the title of Hero of the Soviet Union to Nina Timofeyevna Gnilitskaya, a reconnaissance scout with the 383rd Rifle Division in the fighting around the town of Krasny Luch. She had been an expert at leading patrols into German occupied villages then suddenly assaulting a house to retrieve prisoners for interrogation. Her mission in December went sour and she was injured as the patrol attempted to withdrew, but fought on until bayoneted.

April 1942: The Maltese Endure

"To honour her brave people I award the George Cross to the Island Fortress of Malta to bear witness to a heroism and devotion that will long be famous in history." King George VI; 15 April 1942

General: The U-Boats continue their frenzy off the Americas and the Allies lose 826,500 tons of shipping across the world this month. Malta's severe pummeling forces the British, Polish and Greek submarines based there to leave and most of its aircraft are destroyed on the ground – which means Rommel gets almost all of his supplies this month. Italy, Romania, Hungary, Slovakia and Spain add some 51 Divisions to the German Order of Battle in the USSR this month.

Apr 1st: First meeting of the Pacific War Council in Washington. The defenders of Bataan are on quarter rations and 24,000 men are sick; and now the Japanese are attacking again. The Japanese land on New Guinea at Sorong and Hollandia. The submarine HMS Urge sinks the Italian Heavy Cruiser Bande Nere. Douglas MacArthur is a complex figure. The son of a general who won the Medal of Honor in the US Civil War, MacArthur is a highly skilled general and a brave man, but with a penchant for theatrics and an imperial air that disconcerts many Americans. The defence of the Philippines is not his most glorious moment (although this saga deserves more attention than it commonly gets). On the direct – and repeated – orders of the President, MacArthur was withdrawn from the Philippines to Australia to find that no relief expedition is being planned, but that the defence of Australia is his next concern. On this day, Roosevelt also awards the Medal of Honor to MacArthur, making this – among other things – the first award of the medal to the son of another man who won it.

Apr 2nd: The British Burma Corps falls back from Prome to avoid encirclement.

Apr 3rd: Mandalay is bombed as the British withdraw up the Irrawaddy. The Japanese stage a massive attack on Bataan, which the starving defenders are almost incapable of resisting.

Apr 4th: A PBY Catalina, piloted by RCAF Squadron Leader Leonard Birchall, called the 'Saviour of Ceylon', manages to warn Ceylon of an incoming raid by four battleships and five carriers before being downed and captured by a submarine. Air Commodore Leonard Joseph Birchall, CM, OBE, DFC, OOnt, CD (6 July 1915 – 10 September 2004) had a very interesting career, for a brief summary, look up *Len Birchall* in Wikipedia.

Two Canadian WW1 Soldiers' Bodies Discovered in France

A body discovered in May 2013 has been identified by DND as the remains of First World War soldier, Sgt James Alexander Milne. A second body, discovered a year earlier, remains unidentified at this time. "We are thankful for the efforts of the Institut national de recherches archéologiques préventives and the Service archéologique municipal d'Arras of France, for the support of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, and for the ingenuity of the Canadian Conservation Institute, which enabled our officers to identify Sergeant Milne, and to conclude the investigation into the unidentified soldier found at Thélus. We will not forget that these men gave all they had so that a century later, we might live in peace," said MND, Harjit Sajjan. Sgt Milne was born in Gellybrands, Cookney, Kincardineshire, Scotland, on February 10, 1883. He is said to have immigrated to Canada somewhere between 1905 and 1911. An unmarried labourer, Milne enlisted in the CEF in Calgary, AB on Jan. 27, 1915. He is believed to have been killed on April 28, 1917, in relation to an operation against a German position known as Arleaux-Loop. He was 34. Almost a century after his death, an archaeological team from the Institut national de recherches archéologiques préventives discovered his remains in a field on the outskirts of Arleux-en-Gohelle, France. The team was in the area carrying out a mandatory



archaeological survey of the land, which is known to be a battlefield of the First World War.

The investigation into the second set of remains, discovered seven kilometres away at Thélus, Pas de Calais, France, has been officially concluded by DND and the CAF. The body cannot be identified at this time. However, both maternal and paternal DNA profiles have been obtained with the hope of a future identification. This unidentified soldier was discovered by the Service archéologique municipal d'Arras on September 27, 2012, during an excavation. He was found only with a metal "CANADA" insignia. He is believed to be one of the 3,426 Canadian military members who went missing during the ten-month long military engagement at Vimy. It is estimated that he died somewhere between Nov. 1, 1916, and the end of July 1917. "Like far too many soldiers who fought in France during the First World War, Sergeant Milne gave his life in service to Canada. The unidentified soldier found at Thélus reminds us of the many brave Canadians still missing or buried without a name from this terrible conflict. We will lay them both to rest with the honour which they and their families deserve in return for their sacrifice," said Kent Hehr, Minister of Veteran Affairs and Associate Minister of National Defence.

Upon discovery of both bodies, the Commonwealth War Graves Commission was notified, and took possession of the remains and artifacts, transporting them to a CWGC facility in Beaurains, France, for safekeeping. "The Commonwealth War Graves Commission is honoured to have assisted in bringing the discovery of Sergeant Milne, and his unidentified countryman, to the attention of his country, and will be honoured again later this year to mark their places of rest with headstones, so that their personal sacrifice may be perpetually remembered," stated BGen (ret'd) David Kettle, Secretary General, the Canadian Agency of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. Sgt Milne's family has been notified and continue to receive support from Veterans Affairs Canada. Sgt Milne's body will be laid to rest later this year by his Regiment in a cemetery outside Arleux-en-Gohelle. The unidentified soldier will be laid to rest later this year as well at the Canadian Cemetery No 2, Neuville-St Vaast, France.

Digital Live-Fire Has Successful First Trial

The Royal Canadian Artillery School (RCAS) recently celebrated the first digitally integrated, live-shoot fire mission trial, showcasing fast

and efficient coordination between the Battery Command Post and the M777 155-mm Howitzers. The ability to conduct digital fire missions is a critical capability, as it allows data to be sent instantly, providing real-time situational awareness to multiple users. Until recently, missions were sent by the originator (the person wanting to strike a target) to the command post by voice, with the message being read back multiple times and constantly double-checked. The message was then input into computer systems manually to calculate the ballistic solution and relayed to the individual guns, again by voice. The time it took to relay the message left room for errors and further delays. With the introduction of the digital fire mission, the data goes from the originator to the command post in fractions of a second. The command post can then verify and transmit the data to the guns, again in mere moments. A secondary benefit to this dramatic increase in efficiency is the ability to share this information with other units and allies on land and sea and in the air, allowing them to assess the information and factor it into their plans. Specifically, for the artillery, this also opens the door to conducting fire missions with coalition partners using similar digital fire mission software to speak to other nations. The RCAS senior leadership watched as members of W Battery, the Instructor in Gunnery Course, and newly qualified gunners achieved an important digitization benchmark using a unique suite of artillery specific software to communicate via a wireless network. This allowed the RCAS to effectively fire multiple 155-mm rounds over several fire missions from the M777. The RCAS will continue to improve its digitization capabilities and advance toward its objectives to modernize artillery training.

New Satellite Will Enhance CAF's Communications Capabilities

Representatives from the CAF and DND were on hand at Cape Canaveral, Florida, on March 18, 2017, to witness the launch of the ninth Wideband Global Satellite Communication (WGS-9) constellation satellite. A United States Delta IV rocket was used to launch the

WGS-9 from the USAF Space and Missiles System Center in Cape Canaveral. The satellite will aid in meeting CAF strategic satellite communications (Satcom) requirements for many years into the future. "Military operations are increasingly dependent on capabilities based in space," said Brigadier General Blaise Frawley, the director general space at the RCAF. "The WGS-9 will further enhance a reliable Satcom network and ensure our forces can communicate effectively to enable success on operations."

Canada contributed \$340 million to the development of the WGS-9 program, which represents the largest financial contribution of the five project partner nations. Canada's participation was made under the Department of National Defence's Mercury Global Project, which leverages the capabilities of eight other WGS satellites already in orbit. Canada gained access to the WGS constellation in May 2013 and has used this capability to support the communications needs of several missions around the world. "Canada's contribution to this effort provides essential communications support for Canadian Armed Forces operations around the world," noted MND Harjit S Sajjan. "Investing in innovative solutions like the Mercury Global Project will keep the Canadian Armed Forces on the leading edge of defence capabilities, while further enhancing relationships with our international partners and allies." Mercury Global Project will ultimately access its full allotted bandwidth from the WGS constellation through anchor stations in Shirleys Bay, Ottawa, ON; Great Village, NS; and CFB Esquimalt, British Columbia — all of which are home to the antennas and associated ground infrastructure.

The ability to exchange large amounts of information between headquarters and deployed forces has become critical to modern military operations. This has been demonstrated in support

of NATO missions such OP Reassurance in Europe and coalition operations such as OP Impact in the Middle East. The Mercury Global Project is an effective way of meeting the CAF's communication requirements for domestic and expeditionary operations. In total, Canada has allocated \$452 million to the Mercury Global Project. This includes the contribution to the ninth satellite acquisition, WGS constellation support, large-scale antennas at three sites in Canada, and strategic deployable terminals. Sharing costs with international partners and allies is a more cost-effective option than building and maintaining a uniquely Canadian satellite system. Besides the United States, which owns and launched the satellite, other international partners involved with the WGS-9 include Denmark, Luxembourg, New Zealand and The Netherlands.

Government Promises to Military and Veterans in Latest Budget

Government promises a Caregiver Recognition Benefit, expansion of Military Family Resource Centres and a Centre for Excellence on Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder in budget

A Caregiver Recognition Benefit, expansion of Military Family Resource Centres (MFRC) and a Centre for Excellence on Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder are amongst the concrete promises the Government of Canada is making to veterans and their families in the 2017 Budget, tabled on March 22 by Parliament. However, details still remain vague surrounding the government's promise to bring lifelong pensions back, a promised made to veterans by the Liberal party in the 2015 elections. More details are expected to be released later this year. For now, though, all the government has stated in the 2017 Budget is, "Specifically, the Government will move forward with its plan to fulfill its commitment to re-establish lifelong pensions as an option for injured veterans. This will provide an option for injured veterans to receive their Disability Award through a monthly payment for life, rather than in a one-time payment. This change to the Disability Award is something that the veterans' community has long advocated for, and the Government remains committed to delivering. The Government has made considerable progress in its work to develop the pension for life option and will announce further details this year," read the Budget.

More tangible measures to benefit CAF, veterans and their families, outlined by Finance Minister Bill Morneau include a new Education and Training Benefit for military members transitioning to civilian life. The benefit would provide more money for veterans going to college, university or technical schools after retiring from the military. This program would begin in April 2018 for veterans honourable released on or after April 1, 2006. This program would be an investment of \$133.9 million over six years. In addition, recognizing the integral role families play in the recovery of ill and injured soldiers, the government has proposed a Caregiver Recognition Benefit that would provide \$1,000 in non-taxable monthly benefits paid directly to caregivers. The Budget also proposes to invest \$147 million over the next six years, and \$15 million per year ongoing, to expand access to the Military Family Resource Centres for the families of veterans medically released from April 2018 onwards. Taking mental health in consideration, Budget 2017 also calls for a Centre for Excellence on Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. The Centre would "have a strong focus on the creation and dissemination of knowledge on prevention, assessment, and treatment of PTSD and related mental health conditions for Veterans and Canadian Armed Forces members." The investment would be in the amount of \$17.5 million over four years, and \$9.2 million per year ongoing.

Additionally, Budget 2017 also promises that the Government will be eliminating the one-year time limit on vocational rehabilitation for survivors and spouses of deceased veterans, establish a Veteran and Family Well-Being Fund, and a veteran emergency fund for veterans and families that fall into financial hardships and need food, shelter, and medicine. As far as defence is concerned, there is no increase in defence spending in the 2017 budget and the government has, instead, pushed forward \$8.48 billion to 2035.

<u>Who Is It</u>



Last Week: This is a picture of 68 Bty driving along the 100 Block East Hastings St in 1917, probably coming from Hastings Park where they frequently went to train. Some of those buildings are still there - notably the building on the corner and the Hotel Regent. 68 Bty was a depot Battery in Vancouver and took in drafts of new soldiers and trained them in all things Artillery before shipping

them off to Europe. In the summer of 1918, with the decision made to send troops to Siberia, the Battery training Cadre was shipped to the UK where they proceeded to draft in experienced Gunners before being shipped off to Russia. 67 and 68 were the two Batteries that went to Siberia and they still exist today. 67 Bty is the Depot Battery at the Royal Canadian School of Artillery at CFB Gagetown and 68 Battery is the gun Battery of the 15 Fd Artillery Regiment.

Note that they are driving on the left of the street. BC didn't change to driving on the right until 1922



Please join us on Tuesday, April 11, 2017 to welcome our guest speaker Keith Maxwell, a member of our Society. He will address our Society on the **100th Anniversary of the Battle of Vimy Ridge**.



To note the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Vimy Ridge, the Churchill Society of British Columbia is sponsoring an historical presentation of this notable achievement by the Canadian Corps in April 1917. The presentation will cover the mobilization and development of Canada's Army in the First World War and the training and experience that prepared it for such a notable achievement. The presentation will look at the Vimy Ridge operation in the larger context of the British Army Spring Offensive of 1917, known as Second Battle of Arras. It will also look at how the battle tied in to the coordinated Allied strategy for the spring of 1917 that culminated in the disastrous Nivelle Offensive by the French Army later in the month.

Vimy was the only time that all four Canadian Divisions attacked simultaneously and virtually every one of the 48 Battalions in the Corps saw action. The Corps captured a large swath of France including Vimy Ridge itself, providing observation and dominance of the Douai Plain, the heartland of France's coal and iron mining area that could no longer be exploited by the occupying Germans. The role of a number of British Columbians, both in senior posts and as notable fighting soldiers will be emphasised to bring the personal aspects of the battle into focus.

Colonel (Retired) Keith Maxwell, OMM, CD is the presenter for this event. Colonel Maxwell retired from a 41 year military career in 2009 and spent his last sixteen years in Belgium assigned to NATO.
