

## 1. NOTES BY LCO J W MORTLOCK, CD. COMMANDING OFFICER

# 2. THE GUNS OF VICTORY: A SOLDIERS EYE VIEW: BELGIUM, HOLLAND AND GERMANY 1944/1945

It is not the intention here to write a "book review" of The Guns of Victory which is the sequel to The Guns of Normandy by Major George G. Blackburn, MC. The two books cover the participation of the 2nd Canadian Corps and, in particular, the 4th Field Regiment, RCA in the NW Europe campaign from Normandy to Germany. Suffice it to say that the sequel deserves the same enthusiastic, unanimous endorsement as its predecessor. There is no doubt that these two books form the best record of the Canadian operations as conducted at the most basic level - in the trenches, in the tanks and manning the guns.

Chapter 65 entitled "The Dash for the Twente Canal" is the author's account of a task force formed to seize the crossing of the Twente Canal in order to cut the lines of retreat of German forces remaining in Holland in early April 1945. The author and his party found themselves riding on the backs of a spearhead of five Daimler Scout Cars from the 8th Recce Regiment. For his part in this operation, George Blackburn was awarded the Military Cross, although one must read the notes on the dust jacket to be aware of this well earned and overdue award.

Local interest is provided in that the five car spearhead was commanded by a Lieutenant Lorne MacKenzie, who developed a nodding acquaintance with George Blackburn during this episode. [Ed's note: Major Lorne MacKenzie, MC, CD is an Associate Member of the 15th Field Regiment, RCA Officers' Mess]. During this operation, the author's superiors realized that he was the oldest living FOO still serving in that capacity in action in the The Royal Canadian Artillery. He was thereupon ordered back to RHQ where he was

appointed 3 I/C of the Regiment, with no duty except to live like a king and in luxury as circumstances might permit. A comment here might be that Canadian mlitary hstory must be thankful that Major George Blackburn, MC did survive his personal war. Had he not, it is unlikely that a story of the "men on the ground" would have ever been a part of the record.

The "Victory Guns" is recommended as a 'read' and to those who have not yet read the "Normandy Guns", you should read that book first so that you read the whole history as it unfolded. As a final note to the Editor of this Newsletter, it may be possible and of interest if Major Lorne MacKenzie, MC, CD could be persuaded to pen his account of the [Editor's Notes: happenings in Chapter 65.

However, I do mention his moving from Italy to 14th Field, when he finds me in a pigpen OP in the Rhineland, in my next book due out this fall - again by McClelland & Stewart. Unfortunately, I can't give you a title - they've not accepted my title, and I don't care for theirs. ## GUNNERS OF YESTERYEAR: MAJOR-GENERAL SIR EDWARD MORRISON. KCMG, CB, DSO, VD. [By Major PDA Harrison, CD, late RCHA (Retired)]

Major-General Sir Edward Whipple Bancroft Morrison was born in London, Ontario on 6 July 1867. He was educated at Galt Collegiate Institute. He became a journalist; first in Hamilton and then in Ottawa, where he was the Editor-in-Chief of the Ottawa Citizen until 1912. He married in 1911 and made his home at 21 McLeod Street, Ottawa. He joined the Canadian Militia in 1898 and from 1899 to 1901 served in "D" Battery, Canadian Field Artillery (CFA). One of his close friends and a regimental colleague was Lieutenant John McRae who was with him in the South Africa where Morrison was mentioned in despatches, became a Brevet Captain and earned a DSO and the South Africa Medal (Queen's Medal) with eight clasps.

In 1901 he rejoined the Militia and made steady progress to command of the 8th Arty Bde CFA. He was gazetted a LCol in the Canadian Permanent Militia and became D Arty on the staff of HQ CFA from 1913-1914. He became CRA 1st Arty Bde, Cdn Expeditionary Force from 1914 to 1915.

[His Medical Officer was Colonel John McRae who served with him until he died of influenza later in the war. It was in April 1915 that John McRae wrote his world famous poem "In Flanders Fields". The poem was published in the April 1915 issue of "Punch" with the poem in McCrae's handwriting on one page and was published in the April 1915 issue of "Punch" with the poem in McCrae's handwriting on one page and facing it were two sketches drawn by Morrison, one showing the HQ RCA Command Post dug in on the banks of the Canal and the other showed a tiny cemetery nearby.] Morrison's service at this time included the Second Battle of Ypres, Festubert, and Givenchy. He then became CRA, 2 Cdn Div Arty, and saw service in 1915-1916 at St Eloi, Third Battle of Ypres and the Somme.

Brigadier-General Morrison became GOC, Cdn Corps Arty from 1915 to 1919. which period included the Battle for Vimy Ridge. His GSO 2 (RA) who did the planning for the battle was Major Allen Brooke who became Chief of the Imperial General Staff as Field Marshall Viscount Alanbrooke under Churchill in WWII. Morrison was involved in all of the following battles: Paschendaele 1917, Hill 70, Canal-du-Nord, Bourlon Wood, capture of Cambrai, Valenciennes and Mons in 1918.

After the War, Morrison served in the Army of Occupation in Germany. He was promoted Major-General in 1918. He was mentioned-in-despatches five times, was made a Commander of the Order of the Bath, a Commander of St Michael and St George, and finally was made a Knight Commander of St Michael and St George. He was made the Inspector-General of Artillery in 1919, Master-General of the Ordnance in 1920. Shortly after he was made Adjutant-General and concluding a distinguished and outstanding career in 1924, he retired to pension.

He was President of the Cdn Artillery Association in 1921, and was the author of a book called With the Guns, which was a collection of letters home, written during the time he was involved with the South African campaign.

## 5. THE RSSO'S PAGE BY CAPTAIN CHRIS BYRNE

It is my pleasure to write a few words about the training and operational state of 15 Field Regiment for the year ending 1996.

The Unit won the trophy for the top Reserve Artillery Unit in the country. This was done in concert with 5(BC) Field Regiment with whom we formed a composite gun battery. As the old maxim goes "If if ain't broke, don't fix it." We are, therefore, in the midst of artillery training with the goal being to once again win the trophy. From a training point of view, 1996 was a good year. Eighty percent of the unit completed the warrior program

and are therefore current on the unit inventory of weapons. Two soldiers are currently serving with the PPCLI Battle Group in Bosnia. Many of our soldiers will be called upon to fill positions for the next rotation in August with the Lord Strathcona's Horse (RC) to fill positions for the next rotation in August with the Lord Strathcona's Horse (RC) Regiment. A number of soldiers and officers completed tours with either 1RCHA or the RCA Battle School and their experience will undoubtedly pay future dividends to this unit.

Despite last minute changes, a great number of individual soldiers completed advanced trade qualifying courses over the summer. This practice will continue as we continue to send students to the Militia Training Centre in Jericho for driver and communicator courses. An item of particular pride for the unit is the QL3 course currently being run by the Unit in the Bessborough Armoury. This course trains independently of the unit and will comprise complete gun detachments (and instructors) on upcoming field exercises. The unit continued to support indirect fire and related tactical training for not exercises. We continue to maintain our footprint in the local community by opening our doors to various service clubs and charities whenever possible. It would be inappropriate if I were not to mention the efforts of our Associates whose assistance in terms of time, expertise and money has gone a long way to helping this Unit. Take it from one who works in the armoury every day and can see the big picture. This unit is better for all of your help. I look forward to working with all ranks and members of 15 Field Regiment to make 1997 a most challenging and rewarding training year.

## 6. THE LOYAL TOAST - "Ladies and gentlemen - the Queen, our Captain-General"

Ever since their formation, the Gunners have enjoyed the honour and privilege of having the reigning Monarch as their Colonel-in-Chief. On St Barbara's Day 1950, while dining in the Royal Artillery Mess at Woolwich, King George VI made it his wish that he should be future be known as "The Captain-General". The Master Gunner at the time was Field Marshal Viscount Alanbrooke and he was honoured to accept this unique distinction.

[Note: The rank of Captain-General had been in used in the Army in the 17th and early 18th centuries and was the most senior of General Officer ranks. The Duke of Marlborough was promoted Captain-General in about 1702, but thereafter its use lapsed. Thus, this unique titular rank had lain dormant for more than two hundred years, until resurrected by the King himself as a mark of his appreciation of the services of the Royal Regiment during the Second World War. Since 1952, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II has been our Captain-General.]

7. VANCOUVER WELSH MEN'S CHOIR

Amongst other things, this article mentioned that the Vancouver Welsh Men's Choir performed at the Open House ceremonies and also that several members of Choir were Associate Members of the Mess].

The Vancouver Weish Men's Choir (VWMC) was formed in 1980 by some members of the Vancouver Welsh Society and has grown from less than 30 to over 100 singing Alongside the Welsh expatriates are men of varied national and ethnic backgrounds, which reflect the multi-cultural character of Canadian society. Thus the Choir is not an ethnic choir as the name might imply. As a matter of fact, only a small percentage of the choir is Welsh-Canadian. The "Welsh" in the Choir's name refers to tradition. As most choral fans know, some of the most famous male choirs are the choirs of Wales. Naturally, the Choir has attracted several ex-countrymen. However, the VWMC builds its membership with men drawn to the grand tradition of "The Love of Singing."

The Choir has toured in England, Wales, Australia, New Zealand and the USA. It has performed at two World Expositions and took part in an International Festival of Male Choirs at Vancouver in 1990. The men have sung with the Vancouver Symphony, two bands of the Canadian Armed Forces, visiting choirs from the UK and Europe and with well known Canadian singers both on staged and on national TV.

Robin Thomas has been Music Director of the VWMC since 1987. With conducting experience at the school, college, community, church and professional levels, he is frequently engaged as a guest conductor, adjudicator and choral clinician. In Robin Thomas the Choir has found a leader with imagination and vivid presentation. Andy Hillhouse, soloist and choral assistant with the vwmc holds Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Education degrees from UBC where he majored in voice. .

The VWMC is a non-profit group funded by the efforts and contributions of its members. Concert fees and sales of recordings help to reduce the high cost of leaging to this Choir. We look forward to attending forthcoming presentations of the Vancouver Welsh Men's Choir and wish them continued success in the future.


