Legion of Honour- Battle of Normandy Veterans

On June 6, 2014, Canada will mark the 70th anniversary of D-Day and the Battle of Normandy. Many activities will take place to honour those who lost their lives in the service of Canada and to preserve the memory of their sacrifices and achievements. The Government of France would like to pay special tribute to Canadian Veterans who were part of that campaign by appointing them to the Legion of Honour, the highest honour conferred by the Government of France. The Department of Veterans Affairs has agreed to support this initiative, and we encourage you to participate by nominating candidates for this prestigious decoration.

The Embassy of France is looking for candidates who took part in the battles and military operations surrounding the landings and the campaign to liberate France between June 6 and August 31, 1944. The decorations will be awarded in recognition of outstanding achievements in military or civilian life.

Changes In RCAF Rank Structure In 2014

- Just In Time For the Air Force's 90th Birthday?

"Recommendations for RCAF Rank and Insignia are currently being studied and will soon be proposed to the Chain of Command," the RCAF told **Defence Watch**. "No timeline has been set for a decision." Not much information....as usual for RCAF public affairs. But I noted that this makes it sound like the changes are already worked out but the question(s) remains when


they might be approved and then unveiled? The changes are likely to be approved, since the Harper government wants them to be approved. The suggestion was that the changes might be announced, linked to the anniversary of an historical event.

One **Defence Watch** reader had this suggestion about what that event might be: "Perhaps they are waiting for April 1, 2014. The Canadian Air Force was incorporated into the DND in 1923 and granted royal sanction on April 1, 1924 by King George V. This might be the appropriate date.

Also, there is still the question of when operational aircraft will receive the markings modifications to reflect the new RCAF. The only aircraft sporting the RCAF/ARC markings are the Snowbirds Tutors (under wings) and the VIP Polaris aft of the rear door."

US National Veteran's Art Museum

On Memorial Day 2001, the museum added a stirring and spectacular new exhibit to its already highly praised fine art collection. The work of art, an immense 10 x 40 foot sculpture entitled *Above and Beyond*, is comprised of imprinted dog tags, one for each of the more than 58,000 service men and women who died in the Vietnam War. *Above and Beyond* is the first new permanent Vietnam War memorial, other than The Wall in Washington, DC, to list all those killed in action. *Above and Beyond* at the National Veterans Art Museum is a singular



honor for Chicago. It was even the subject of a question on the TV show, Jeopardy, on Jan. 10, 2011.

When visitors first entered the museum's original location on South Indiana Avenue, they heard a sound

like wind chimes coming from above them and their attention was drawn upward 24 feet to the ceiling of the two-story high atrium. They saw there above them, tens of thousands of metal dog tags, spaced evenly one inch apart, suspended from fine lines that allowed them to move like a living thing with the shifts in air currents.

Suicides Among Reservists Not Included in Canadian Forces Data

OTTAWA – Despite the suicides of three Afghan war veterans this week, a military psychiatrist says there has not been a recent increase in suicide rates among Canadian Forces members. But the numbers of soldiers dealing with the effects of post-traumatic stress disorder are expected to rise within the next decade as the stress of combat takes hold in those who have returned from the fighting in Afghanistan, Col Rakesh Jetly said Friday.

That is a troubling prospect as the military grapples with the latest rash of suicides, which are shining a spotlight on the programs the military has available for dealing with cases of PTSD. Critics have also questioned how the Canadian Forces tracks suicides among its members, and whether the numbers paint an accurate picture.

The military doesn't include suicides among reservists in the data, even though it keeps tabs on them, leading to speculation that the actual rates may be much higher. "We track them, we have them, we do investigate. If a Class B reservist (completes a suicide) we'll do an investigation there as well." Jetly told a teleconference Friday. "The problem is, it's been very, very difficult for us within the organization to actually accurately capture reservists," he explained. "We're just afraid that if we just sort of start trying to tabulate them that the numbers will be misleading."

I think he's got a brilliantly simple idea, and it's worth sharing. Whether it's old tour buddies or just people from days of old that it would be good to reconnect with, this could make a difference that someone needs. Please pass it around.

RE: "Send up the count" - Checking up on tour buddies

Most of you have seen the news today. Two soldiers connected to Shilo killed themselves. Another in St Jean was in an armed standoff with police. There will be more, and soon. Others are losing battles with operational stress injuries, addictions, collapsing relationships, or whatever. Afghanistan veterans are sleeping on the streets....

Many of us have deployed. Most of us have kept in touch with some of our buddies from tour. But there are plenty who have fallen through the cracks. Maybe it was the social retard most people were able to tolerate but nobody really liked. Maybe it was that guy who was full of himself. Whatever- it is irrelevant.

On fighting patrols we periodically 'send up the count' to make sure that everyone in the order of march is still accounted for. This is what I want to see happen as a grassroots, no bullshit, no agenda, no politics initiative by individual soldiers and leaders. I've initiated this with my old platoon from my tour in 2008; my goal is 100% verification that everyone who was in that platoon is good to go, or if they're not, that they're receiving needed help and have someone to talk to. There are a lot of systems and mechanisms in place officially; most seem damaged or

broken right now. So it falls on us to look after the men and women to our left and our right.

Get in touch with your old platoon, particularly the leadership. Dig up an old nominal role if you have one. Facebook, DWAN, text message, whatever- make sure that every single person in your platoon/troop/det on tour is asked by someone "How're you doing? What are you up to these days? Do you need anything?"

You may be the person who makes the difference and saves the life of a Canadian soldier or veteran. If not, you will have reconnected with old buddies, and your time will NOT be wasted.

Ottawa – The Honourable Julian Fantino, Minister of Veterans Affairs, today issued the following statement:

"Our Government is dedicated to ensuring Veterans and their families have the support they need, when and where they need it, from coast to coast to coast. "In order to support Canadian Veterans in their communities, Veterans Affairs Canada delivers a number of personalized benefits such as home visits by a registered nurse or case manager, in addition to grass cutting, snow clearing and home cleaning services. "We have also made improvements such as increasing the number of case managers in the regions where Veterans need them most, and opening and maintaining 17 operational stress injury clinics and 24 integrated personnel support centres near Canadian Armed Forces bases and in major city centres right across Canada. As well, we recently expanded the reach of Veterans Affairs Canada by partnering with Service Canada to offer assistance to Veterans at close to 600 points of service in every region across the country.

"That partnership is being further strengthened: in regions where underused area offices will be winding down operations as of January 31, 2014, a Veterans Affairs Canada employee will be working out of the nearest Service Canada location to assist Veterans with their benefit applications, answer their questions and help them get access to services. This change means that a Veterans Affairs Canada client service agent will be assigned to Service Canada offices in Kelowna, British Columbia; Saskatoon, Saskatchewan; Brandon, Manitoba; Thunder Bay, Ontario; Windsor, Ontario; Sydney, Nova Scotia; Charlottetown, P.E.I.; and Corner Brook, Newfoundland and Labrador. "This enhancement is being made to ensure that strong support remains in place for Veterans and families in communities where the change in service is taking place. It will assist with the transition, and is in addition to all the other ongoing services and support already provided, including home visits for Veterans who are seriously injured, the tollfree service offered through our National Veterans Contact Network and the range of payments provided to Veterans going through rehabilitation and transitioning into civilian life. "We are committed to serving the men and women who have served Canada, as well as their families. We will continue to make improvements to ensure they receive the very best
