<u> World War 2 - 1940</u>

Mar 9th: Mussolini is on hand to watch 12 of his divisions begin a sledgehammer style offensive against well-prepared and alert Greek defences in southern Albania.

Mar 10th: The British-African army that captured Mogadishu 13 days ago has traveled almost 1,000 km to the north before coming into contact with Italian troops at Dagabur in Ethiopia.

Mar 11th: The Lend Lease Act passes into law in the United States as Public Law 1776, but Congress has attached riders that do much to limit British trade and their post-war recovery. Australians and Canadians: A Proven Naval Team

A team of seven members of the RCN are contributing to counterterrorism and maritime security operations in the Middle East as part of OP ARTEMIS, Canada's contribution to Combined Task Force 150. The Canadian contingent is integrated into the Royal Australian Navy (RAN) CTF-150 command staff for a total of 26 personnel. The RCN

team is under the command of Captain (Navy) William Quinn, who is serving as Deputy Commander and Chief of Staff to CTF-150. Naval Combat Information Operators, working as Battle Watch Assistants, Maritime Surface and Sub-Surface (MARS) Officers in the role of Battle Watch Captains, a Logistics Officer working in the logistics branch, and a MARS Officer contributing to planning and training, make up the rest of the RCN contingent. "The Battle Watch serves as the focal point of communications during a narcotics seizure. We are the interface between the Combined Maritime Force, the TF Commander, and the unit at sea that is seizing the illicit cargo. It can get a little busy." said a Royal Canadian Navy member acting as Battle Watch Assistant.

The Canadians' journey to Bahrain started in Watson's Bay in Sydney, Australia. There, they began preparations for integrating into the Australian command staff of CTF-150 marking the continuation of a successful Canadian-Australian partnership. Over a period of three weeks, the Canadian contingent underwent rigorous training exercises consisting of scenarios they might encounter during their deployment. During this training, they were mentored by a specialized team of RAN sailors who had served in previous CTF-150 rotations. CTF-150's mission is to promote maritime security in order to counter terrorist acts and related illegal activities, which terrorists use to fund or conceal their movements. The CTF-150 Area of Operations (AO) covers a vast swath of water including the Red Sea, Gulf of Aden, most of the Indian Ocean,

and the Gulf of Oman. CTF 150 is one of three task forces that comprise the Combined Maritime Force, a multi-national partnership created to defeat terrorism, prevent piracy, and encourage regional cooperation in the greater Arabian Gulf region.

The newly-formed command team wasted no time getting into the mission. Coordinating a group of hardworking ships at sea from their location in Bahrain, CTF-150 staff identified and tracked vessels of interest within their AO. Halfway into the current deployment, the results speak for themselves. Over 334kg of heroin has been taken from the hands of narcotics smugglers at sea. The seizure and destruction of these drugs in the first two months of operations, under the current command, has deprived international terrorist organizations of an estimated \$43 000 000 USD of funding and directly contributed to the safe passage of merchant ships through the region. "We have enjoyed working shoulder to shoulder with our Royal Australian Navy counterparts over these last four months, from our training period in Australia to our ongoing operations controlled from our HQ in Bahrain. We look forward to continuing our mission to ensure maritime security and international stability in some of the world's most important shipping lanes and busiest waterways." stated Captain (N) William Quinn, Deputy Commander/Chief of Staff – Combined Task Force 150

Tank Recovered from Ship Torpedoed by U-Boat Off Russian Coast



German torpedo launched from the U-boat *U-968*. The cargo ship, which was travelling in the Arctic convoy JW65, sank close to the shores of Kildin Island on March 20th, 1945. The Thomas Donaldson was transporting 7679 tons of cargo when it was sunk, including tanks, 6000 tons of ammunition, and assorted other vehicles.

A rusty but well-preserved World War Two tank was recovered in 2014 in the Barents Sea after having been discovered amongst the wreck of a US cargo ship. The ship was sunk by a German submarine in the last days of World War II. It spent nearly 70 years on the bottom of the sea before finally being recovered. The tank, an American M4A2(76)W Sherman, was being transported on the USS Thomas Donaldson when the ship was hit by a



A German torpedo hit the engine room directly but, despite its haul of dangerous cargo, only 3 people died when the ship was hit – one officer and two crew members who were below deck at the time. With the engines destroyed and the threat of the flammable ammunition, the captain of the ship ordered all 8 officers, 34 crewmen, and 27 armed guards into life-boats, while he himself remained behind, the Mail Online reports. The ship was destroyed, but it was not sinking yet. The captain hoped to wait for a rescue ship to tow them back to port, but before that could happen the Thomas Donaldson sank stern-first into the sea only half a mile from the shores of Kilden Island, near the Russian city of Murmansk. On July 23, 2014 the cargo ship was discovered by divers at only 55 metres deep. The divers report that there are two other tanks on board the wreck which will be salvaged.

Focus on Veterans, Not Dumb Rules

Appearing before the Senate veteran's affairs committee this week, veterans' ombudsman Guy Parent said veteran benefits have become too tangled up in complex and "byzantine" rules and too little focused on outcomes we want to achieve for our veterans. Unless that changes, he argued,

"we will continue to disadvantage many of our veterans and their families, as we have done for almost 100 years." It would be hard to think of a better example of what Mr Parent is saying than the sad case of Second World War veteran Harold Cameron and his wife Virginia. They met and married during the war and have been inseparable for 70 years. But those byzantine Veterans Affairs rules won't allow Mr Cameron to receive long-term care benefits unless he lives separately from his wife — something he and his family understandably find unacceptable.

Harold and Virginia Cameron are both in their nineties and both are in need of 24-hour long-term care. He has Alzheimer's and she is developing dementia. Mr Cameron qualifies for care at Camp Hill Veterans Hospital, but Veterans Affairs says his wife does not, because she isn't a veteran. The agency won't allow them to live at Camp Hill as a couple.

They are determined not to live apart. Their loving loyalty to one another is something any family can understand. The injustice of making them suffer for an inflexible interpretation of a poorly-conceived rule is obvious as well. Is this really the outcome the Government of Canada wants to achieve for frail, elderly married veterans — to destroy the love and support they can derive from the last few years of their marriages?

In our Opinions section today, former New Democrat MP Peter Stoffer calls upon Veterans Affairs Minister Kent Hehr and Nova Scotia Health Minister Leo Glavine to do the right thing and to arrange for Mrs Cameron to be admitted with her husband to Camp Hill. We support

that call wholeheartedly. The ministers should use their authority to provide the compassionate outcome Harold and Virginia Cameron deserve. As Mr Stoffer points out, the two governments have agreed in the past to allow non-veterans to use available Camp Hill beds and are doing so today. And the Veterans Act clearly gives the minister that authority. It says his duties and functions "extend and apply to" not only the care and treatment of Canadian Forces and Merchant Marine personnel, but also "of any other person designated by the Governor in Council." It also gives the minister authority over "the care of dependants or survivors." So Mr Hehr either has the authority, or can obtain it from cabinet, to have Mrs Cameron designated for care at Camp Hill. Keeping the Camerons together is also in the spirit of the mandate letter Mr Hehr received from Prime Minister Justin Trudeau.

"Your overarching goal," it proclaims, "will be to ensure that our government lives up to our sacred obligation to veterans and their families." "I expect you to ensure that veterans receive the respect, support, care, and economic opportunities they deserve." Harold and Virginia Cameron deserve to receive care at Camp Hill as the devoted couple they are. As Mr Stoffer says, it is the right thing to do.

3 Type XXI boats in the Elbe II in Hamburg

These boats were missing until 1985 when the boats were discovered through research by Jak P Mallmann-Showell, Wolfgang Hirschfeld and Walter Cloots in the mostly demolished Elbe II U-boat bunker in Hamburg. The Elbe II bunker is located on the southern bank of the Elbe river at the Vulkanhafen. This area is within the Freeport of Hamburg and to access it you should have to present your passport.

The boats lying there are U-2505, U-3004 and U-3506. They are lying on the surface at low tide but are not accessible to the casual observer and are stationed on a private property. The author believes the bunker has been filled with gravel now to prevent injuries as the area is considered dangerous. The

boats have been partially scrapped (two are missing conning towers and engine sections)

sometime after the war. U-3506 is lying trapped under the heavy roof and is the most intact boat.

Want To Buy a Second Hand Fighter Jet? Head to Albania

The 40 obsolete Soviet and Chinese-made aircraft up for sale once roared over what was Europe's most exclusive airspace. The Albanian pilots were members of an exalted military elite that had its own food-tasters and was tasked by Communist Albania's paranoid regime with deterring countless enemies who never did come to this country on the Adriatic Sea. Now a NATO member, Albania is auctioning off the rusting jets to pay for modernizing its military and to save space in its air bases. The Socialist government says it has received strong interest from aviation collectors and museums abroad – so much that it pushed back the initial auction date and is considering raising the starting bids, first set at 1.1 million to 1.9 million leks (\$8,600-14,800). "It was a surprise for us," Defense Minister Mimi Kodheli told The Associated Press, noting "a rush" of interest from prospective bidders in the United States, Germany, France, Italy and other countries.

In a corner of the Rinasi air base outside the capital of Tirana, 11 decrepit MiG-17 and MiG-19 jets are parked in neat rows, guarded by two military officers. Their silver-grey paint with the distinctive red, black and red roundels is fading, their tires are flat, the guns are rust-flecked and some of their glass canopies are broken. Former jet mechanic Vasil Jongari, 55, seemed almost ashamed to show the planes to visiting journalists. "There is nostalgia always," he said, running his fingers over the 32 millimeter gun on a MiG-19. "But they cannot be kept only based on desire. They need money, and money we don't have." Ilirjan Kola, 61, who flew Albanian air force MiG-15 to MiG-19 jets from 1976 until 1991, said the planes were always so expensive to operate. "MiGs were so costly," he told The Associated Press. "A twin-engine MiG-19 consumed 52 liters of fuel a minute. With a normal flight of 30-40 minutes, imagine the expense ... Better that they had sold them before." Albania's air force was founded in 1951 and received MiGs from the Soviet Union until 1962. After Communist leader Enver Hoxha broke with the Russians, the country continued to be supplied with planes and spares from Communist

China – until 1977, when Albania also severed ties with the

Chinese.

About 160 Albanian pilots graduated from a military academy in southwestern Vlora, and used to clock up about 80 flying hours a year. Only five still serve – and now they all fly helicopters. "We were privileged at the time, with specially chosen food, shelter, health care and vacations," Kola said. He said the food came from a dedicated farm near the air base, which a doctor tasted for them on a daily basis. "(It wasn't) different from what they did with the food destined for Hoxha himself," Kola said. At the collapse of the Communist regime in 1990, the air force had 200 jets and 40 helicopters, as well as four IL14 transport planes, once used for top regime officials, which were sold for scrap five years ago. Seven MiGs were destroyed and their parts were stolen in 1997, when military bases across the country were looted during an uprising over failed pyramid investment schemes that cost many Albanians their life savings. Some jet continued to be flown after order was restored, but a deadly accident at this air base in 2004 prompted a rethink. A farewell flight was held in 2005, Jongari said.

Albania joined NATO in 2009, and now its military aviation fleet consists of Western-made helicopters – four French Cougars, three German EC145s and 13 Italian AB205, AB206 and A109 models. The aircraft up for auction at a yet-undefined date include five types of military jets – Yak-18, MiG-15, MiG-17, MiG-19, and MiG-21 – as well as four Mi-4 transport helicopters. Most date from the 1950s. "We can use the money to modernize our armed forces," said Kodheli, the defense minister. The Albanian army has already got rid of its antique Eastern Bloc-era transport vehicles, tanks and armored personal carriers, as well as infantry AK-47 assault rifles and ammunition, most of which was sold for scrap. Kodheli said the auction will serve as a market test. If it's successful, Albania has more than 100 other aircraft left to be sold some day.

Last Week: This car is a Steyr 50, a small car released in 1936 by the Austrian automobile manufacturer Steyr. The car had a water-cooled four-cylinder boxer engine driving the rear wheels through a four-speed transmission. To save room and weight a dynastarter (starter and charger combined) was used, which doubled as the axle of the radiator fan. It was regarded as the "Austrian Peoples' Car" and was

affectionately referred to as the Steyr "Baby". The little Steyr offered better seating and luggage space than Porsche's Volkswagen with shorter overall length, a large sheet metal sliding roof and was available with hydraulic brakes (instead of the early Volkswagens' cable-operated ones). When the war began, the factory started producing 'militarized' versions of the different models they produced.
